From the President's Desk Ray Andrae

I recently returned to Texas to participate in two events at UTA, and I have returned to Georgia with a new sense of pride and excitement about our Corps of Cadets.

Before I tell you about the events, let me tell you what has gotten me so excited about the Corps. First, fall enrollment is 150, a 20% increase over last year. The Corps has the highest number of four-year ROTC scholarships ever-22. The female Ranger Challenge Team took "FIRST PLACE" among female teams. They consistently out-performed other male and coed teams that participated. Their average PT score was 316. This is truly an outstanding accomplishment and reflects the outstanding quality of our cadets. I particularly noted the high degree of Esprit de Corps demonstrated by all the cadets during my visit, and it made me extremely proud.

Now about those two events. First, it was my pleasure to make a special presentation of insignia (a set of crossed rifles with the letters ATS) worn back in the 1913-16 period when



UTA was Arlington Training School. The insignia was sent to the CCAC by Colonel



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2007 Distinguished Alumnus General Charles C. Cannon

The

2007 Distinguished Alumni award winner from the Military Science Department is Major General Charles C. Cannon, Jr., UTA class of 1967.

General Cannon was commissioned a 2d Lieutenant Charles C. Cannon in the Quartermaster Corps.

General Cannon served in five Army divisions, with overseas assignments in Vietnam, Korea, Croatia, and three tours in Germany. In 1992 he was promoted to Brigadier General and assumed command of the 3d Corps Support Command in Wiesbaden, Germany. He was then selected to command the IFOR (Implementation Force) Support Command in Zagreb, Croatia. He has been inducted into the Army Quartermaster Hall of Fame, the highest honor a quartermaster officer can receive. He has also been inducted into the Military Science Hall of Honor. He received numerous awards and decorations including the Defense Distinguished Service medal.

General Cannon is currently the LOGCAP (Logistics Civil Augmentation Program) program manager for DynCorp International, providing logistic services to the Army worldwide.

He and his wife Karen live in Fort Worth. They have two children and two grandchildren.

competed in eight events, including a physical fitness test, day and night orienteering, and weapons assembly and disassembly.

Though only one other school brought a women's team to the challenge, UTA's team consistently outperformed the 33 other male, female and coed teams. Theirs was the highest score overall for the day orienteering challenge and third highest for the physical fitness test. Maj. Ricardo Diaz, military science assistant professor, said, "Our female team was good enough to compete and win against any coed team and most of the all-male teams."

"We train six days a week at six in the morning with the men's team," the team's coach, senior Vanessa Medina, said. "Every time we do [physical tests] in the morning, we do everything the guys do—just as much push-ups, just as much running and sit-ups as the guys' team."

LTC Kevin Smith said the team members excel at more than military service. Medina's younger sister, nursing freshman Analise Medina, joined the team this year and received a fouryear scholarship for college. Another member, communications junior Bethany Nord, is a trained singer and performs the national anthem at certain ROTC events. "They are strong examples of the next generation of leaders," Smith said. "This is just

an example of one way they continue to excel."

a Ranger, Black Belt, and a Green Beret, Welch had created a drill team at Texas Tech using all his knowledge and skills as a soldier and a Jody. Welch wanted to test his elite protégés, and decided to put on a competition in Lubbock. A number of college drill teams were invited, including the Jodies. This would be a real test for the Sam

Houston Rifles. After all, Welch was the best of the best. He was a past commander, combat veteran, and he had the Jodies' playbook.

I was still a Military Police Captain in some reserve unit, and was able to wiggle myself in as one of the judges. The Jodies clearly didn't need my biased help. Even Welch said that the Jodies kicked butt that

day and certainly deserved the first place overall trophy. I remember thinking that "back in my day" we were good, but the teams of the '70s, although smaller, were much better.

Of course, for many of us, the years on the team were the best and most meaningful years of our lives, but for a handful of guys the '70s created some fond memories as well. Somewhere in the early '70s Rudd got the gig to provide the bus to take the team to El Paso for a competition. Names like Parker, Goldman, Stevens, L. Ellis, Beck, Cooper, Darwin, Mahoney Maynard, Meza, Morrow, Val Prather, Stan Thompson, and Stan Wright bubble to the surface. Floyd Wine and I hitched a ride on the bus, as chaperones—kinda like Jesse James watching the bank!

Although 37 years or so has dulled the overall trip, a few things stick out in my mind. It was a lay-down hand

that the Jodies would win the competition, but a few other things jump out as well. Rudd "fell in love" with Betty, a sponsor of one team from Colorado Springs—she was a Park Ranger, and Rudd had visions of camping out in the snow and stalking Bambi with her. Of course, Rudd's criteria for a suitable companion would be, "Is she breathing?" Floyd kept the entire bus entertained with his

singing and guitar he knew "the words to about a million tunes." Floyd not only knew the "Sons of the Pioneers", he knew their grandparents. The audience on the bus included the car load of co-eds that were picked up along the road. A young man of the team was assigned the task of

driving their car while the girls partied with the troops on the bus.

And, true to form for one of Rudd's buses, the team had to push the thing off at every Dairy Queen stop along the way.

The '70s were good times for the alumni. Association was cooking. We were bringing the largest group of UTA Alumni to campus; the drill team was in top form, and having graduated or left school, that pesky business of having to study was no longer on the plate. Military, in general, had taken a hit as a result of Viet Nam, but the Jodies, UTA, and the Alumni were as strong as ever. Some details were withheld—not to protect the innocent—there were none, but because some of the details have faded over time.

Not quite the magic of the '50s and '60s, but memorable nevertheless. Bunky Garonzik
