LTC Alba first entered the Army as a 72G (Signal Technician) before gaining admittance to West Point, where he received a degree in Aerospace Engineering. After attending the Armor Officer Basic Course, his first duty assignment was in Vilseck, Germany, as a Tank Platoon Leader with C Company, 1-37 Armor Regiment, 1st Armored Division during Operation Desert Shield. He served as the 1-37 AR Scout Platoon Leader shortly after Desert Shield. Afterwards, he attended both the Armor Officer Advanced Course and the Aviation Officer Advanced Course. His next assignment carried him to South Korea, where he was the assistant S-3 of 5-17 CAV, 2ID at Camp Pelham before becoming Commander of A Troop, 5-17 CAV, 2ID. It still has the tremendous support of the administration and the watchful presence of the alumni—if you're not careful, you can still run into COL Ward, COL Andre, and Jerry Thomas in the hallways. And I am still amazed by how much the cadets are able to balance – work, families, academics, physical training, and extracurricular activities.

I credit the unchanging excellence of this program to a legacy that most of us probably don't even realize until we leave College Hall. The unmatched energy and optimism of former PMS LTC Mark Martin; the kindness of MAJ David Hoffman, my first Battalion XO, who made me want to be an Adjutant General Corps officer so I could be like him; the "tough love" of my Battalion Training Officer, CPT Robert Jean; the respect for tradition of CPT Bruce Kimmery, who authored "I am a Maverick" while I was a Senior; the quiet professionalism and high standards of the Battalion Admin Officer, CPT John Little; and every bit of tactical proficiency that I carried with me into the Army as taught to me by MS III instructor SFC Righenour.

I hope to be able to bring home a piece of all of that to the current-day Corps of Cadets, as well as my own brand of leadership—the "Maverick" in me that is always looking for a solution outside of the box, perhaps a new and different take on how to develop leaders, to care for soldiers and their families, and to teach cadets to take that sort of Maverick leadership with them as they meet the challenges that face the Army today. *CPT Jeannie Deakyne*

The summer drive is on with the final push of the year. We have spent the last 2 to 16 months prospecting, interviewing, and recruiting the latest group of talented future leaders for the fall class. For some, we started during their junior year of high school or, for others, while they were in Iraq and Afghanistan. But all of them showed promise and potential to be tremendous leaders.

The goal is to have 150 to 160 cadets in the fall, by enrolling 50 new freshmen, 10 new sophomores, and 5 new juniors. We hope to have at least 15 of our incoming freshmen on four-year Army scholarships. We will continue to recruit for the fall semester at freshman orientations and other events over the summer. All that and we have already started recruiting for fall 2009.

Initial projections look good. The Maverick Battalion continues to seek assistance from some of the best key Centers of Influence (COI) we have, our alumni. We need everything from the experienced warrior ready to expand his role in the Army, NCO to Officer, to the individual who comes to us without any experience but with great potential. COI influence and participation is critical to our growth. *LTC Kevin Smith*

LTC Alba (Continued from page 1) receiving a Master's Degree in Applied Physics (Nuclear Weapons and Effects). True to his commissioning roots, LTC Alba returned to West Point where he instructed courses in Physics (Electricity and Magnetism), as well as serving as an Assistant Professor and Course Director for Nuclear Reactor Analysis and Nuclear Reactor Design. After West Point, he attended the Command and General Staff College, with a follow-up assignment to Fort Hood, where he served as the Executive Officer of 2-12 CAV, 2nd BDE, 1st Cavalry Division. In January 2004, he deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom II as the BN S-3. He completed the OIF II deployment as the Executive Officer for the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, C-3, Multi-National Force-Iraq and the Officer-in-Charge, MNC-I Transition Cell, Camp Victory, Iraq. Upon his return to

Fort Hood, LTC Alba became the Action Officer, G3 CONOPS, III Corps. From there he served at the Pentagon in Washington, DC, as the Army Watch Officer, HQDA G-3, and as the Action Officer, DAMO-ODO (Officer of the Director of Operations). In November 2005 he deployed once again in Support of Operation Iraqi Freedom as the Secretary of the Combined Joint Staff, Multi-National Corps-Iraq at Camp Victory in Iraq and later became the Secretary of the General Staff for III Corps at Fort Hood upon his redeployment in February 2008.

LTC Alba speaks Tagalog (Filipino) and the Bicol dialect. His awards include the Silver Star, the Bronze Star Medal (2 OLC), the Meritorious Service Medal (2OLC), the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, the Combat Action Badge, the Basic Parachutist Badge, and the Air Assault Badge.

He is a member of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers, the American Board of Trial Advocates, the Million Dollar Advocates Forum, and the Dallas Bar Association. career Army officer—combat seasoned as a Ranger during the Normandy Invasion, connection and patience with the cadets. The definition of “Mentor” is the epitome of what COL Max meant to me, as well as to so many other cadets.



No UTA cadet from 1960 through 2007 can use the word “mentor” without thinking of COL Charles McDowell. From parachuting behind enemy lines during the liberation of Czechoslovakia, to serving with the Joint Chiefs, to teaching Russian at UTA for decades, Dr. McDowell truly made a global footprint. He was a role model and an inspiration to so many young men and women. Always a smile, and always a helping hand.

Sure, there were guys like COL Johnston, or Jackson, or whatever his name was, who appeared to just be biding time in his assignment as PMS while waiting until retirement. And no cadet in the early '60s could forget CPT Pride or Joy or ? His name also escapes me somehow. Although able to get Doug Welch's DMS retracted, he was unable to prevent his commissioning. Welch went on to become an Airborne Ranger, a Green Beret, and a decorated hero in Viet Nam and retired as a Colonel. One other not-so-distinguished member of the cadre during my era comes to mind—Captain Nerd, let's call him—over-weight, horrible attitude toward the cadets, arrogant, and generally a poor example to the cadets. Now in all fairness, and in a politically correct climate, this is

my perception of these guys. To be sure, as it relates to me personally—I was a handful to deal with. I'm sure there were a few cadets (although I don't know any personally) who considered these guys decent soldiers.
