# 2011 Military Science Hall Of Honor Inductees

Brigadier General Ricky D. Gibbs, of Austin, TX, was commissioned in 1982 from UTA. He holds a Mas-

ters in Strategic Studies from the United States Army War College. His many and varied assignments over the years took him to Germany, all over the United States, and to the Middle East in Desert Shield/Desert Storm. BG Gibbs assumed the duties of Commander, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Fort Riley, Kansas July 2005. In February 2007 his Brigade deployed to Baghdad, Iraq as part of the Army's "surge" in support of Operation Iraq Freedom. He commanded the 4th IBCT as it conducted counterinsurgency operations in Baghdad's Rashid Security District. He served as Chief of Staff of the 1st Infantry Division from May 2008 to June 2009 when he assumed the duties of Deputy Commanding General for Maneuvers, the position he now holds. He is married and has two children.

Colonel Joe B. Swift of Dallas, TX, entered ASC in 1958. On the Rifle Team, he won many state and na-



tional championships and he was a Distinguished Military Graduate in 1963. COL Swift had an impressive career that included two tours of duty in Vietnam, among other assignments. He also received a Masters degree in Industrial Psychology. After 31 years of active and reserve duty he retired as a colonel in 1994. COL Swift worked for Aerospatiale Helicopter Corporations in Grand Prairie, TX as the Reliability/Maintainability Engineer, managing 53 service facilities throughout the U.S. and Canada. He retired in 1989, moved to Seattle, WA, and managed his own small tool distribution company. In 1996 he came back to Arlington to work with Bell Helicopter. He retired again in 2004. He and his wife Betty live in Arlington, TX. They have three sons, one daughter, and eight grandchildren.

Major John Gallatin Kearby, brother of Medal of Honor winner Colonel Neel Kearby, attended North



Texas Agricultural College from 1923 to 1925. He taught school briefly, and then received a degree from SMU. He worked for a time at Standard Laboratories, and in 1941, just prior to Pearl Harbor, he entered the Army Air Corps and attained the rank of major. He was assigned to the top-secret Material Command's Equipment Laboratory at Wright Field and was selected to oversee development of high-altitude protective garments. He was apparently the first army officer to test a pressure suit in the altitude chamber and in flight, at considerable risk to himself. He died in a plane crash in 1943 during the probable testing of experimental and confidential auto-pilot controls. He received the Distinguished Flying

Cross posthumously.



Lt. Gen. James F. Hollingsworth was one of the most decorated military officers ever to come out of Texas A&M University and North Texas Agricultural College (in 1936). A San Antonio resident for the past 18 years, Hollingsworth, 91, died March 2, 2010.

In the Army for 36 years, he served during World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. The three-time recipient of the Distinguished Service Cross also received four Distinguished Service Medals, four Silver Stars, three Legion of Merit medals, the Distinguished Flying Cross three times over, the Soldier's Medal, four Bronze Stars, and a remarkable 38 Air Medals, among many others. Wounded in combat during World War II, Hollingsworth also received six Purple Hearts. He retired in 1976.
