versity of Kansas and a Master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Kansas.

LTC Rimmer was commissioned a Signal Officer in May 1990. Her first duty assignment was in Heilbronn, Germany with the 34th Signal Battalion from December 1990-July 1991. She deployed with the unit in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm serving as both a platoon leader and company operations officer. Upon redeployment and the deactivation of the battalion, she transferred to the 440th Signal Battalion in Darmstadt, Germany where she served as Assistant S4, S4 and then again as a platoon leader, providing communications support to the V Corps Headquarters.

From 1993-1996, she took a break in active service. In 1996, she was promoted and joined the 325th Quartermaster Battalion, United States Army Reserve, as their Battalion S6. In September 1999, Lieutenant Colonel Rimmer re-entered active service as part of the Captain's Recall Program.

LTC Rimmer was assigned to Fort Lewis, Washington in May 2000 where she assumed duties as an Operations Officer for the 142nd Signal Brigade (Forward). In December 2000, she assumed command of Delta

Company, 29th Signal Battalion where she and her soldiers supported numerous Joint and multinational training exercises in the Pacific theater including Japan, Korea, and Thailand. In August 2002, LTC Rimmer relinquished command and reported to the 2nd Brigade, 75th Division (Training Support) in San Antonio, Texas where she performed duties as an Observer Controller/Trainer, Brigade S6 and Brigade S1.

In 2005, LTC Rimmer reported to Fort Hood, Texas where she served as the Network Operations Officer for 4th Infantry Division and 1st Cavalry Division, spearheading both Divisions' modular transformation of the Joint Network Transport Capability. She deployed with the 1st Cavalry Division from October 2006 - December 2007 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Upon redeployment, she departed Fort Hood, Texas for an assignment at the Combined Arms Center in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

LTC Rimmer's awards include the Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (3 OLC), Army Commendation Medal (4 OLC), and the Army Achievement Medal (1 OLC).

LTC Rimmer is married to Chief Warrant Officer 3 Christopher T. Rimmer and has one son, Ian.

Where Are They Now

Jim graduated and was commissioned from ASC in July '63. After basic he completed Ranger and Airborne Schools. He finished in January '64 and married Annette on January 31st. March '65 to Febru-

ary '66 he attended the Fixed Wing Aviation Course at Fort Rucker and was later stationed at Fort Sill, and there formed a Birddog company. He was deployed to Vietnam from June '66 to May '67 flying Birddogs as a Forward Air Controller. Jim was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

From May '67to May '69 Jim was stationed at Fort Rucker as an instructor pilot in Birddogs, and at the end of this tour he transitioned to helicopters. In May '69 he returned to Vietnam where he flew Hueys in an assault helicopter unit.

From June '70 to April '71, he was stationed at Fort Benning for the Infantry Officers Advance Course. Toward the end of the course, he decided to change branches to Military Intelligence. After graduation from IOAC, he went to Fort Huachuca, AZ for the Tactical Intelligence Staff Officer Course.

Then from June '71- June '74 he was stationed at Defense Intelligence Agency at Arlington Hall Station,

near Washington, DC. He was the desk officer for Bulgaria. His duties included keeping tabs on what was happening in Bulgaria, giving briefings, and integrating info from all sources on the country. While in Washington, he completed his Masters of Science in Systems Management from USC.

From June '74 to December '76 he was stationed at Redstone Arsenal, AL. He was commander of the Special Security Office. Later, Tomlin was stationed at SHAPE in Mons, Belgium. SHAPE is the military wing of NATO. He was again counting Russian nukes, among other things, and providing info for briefings to the SACEUR, General Alexander Haig. Jim was later stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas where he became the commander of ADATS. This was a unit concerned with foreign military equipment and how it performed.

Jim retired in July '83 and began his second career with Lockheed Martin, as Operations Research Analyst, Senior Staff. Currently he works for Lockheed Martin Missiles and Fire Control. His title currently is Operations

He was soon reassigned to the 172nd Stryker Brigade in Fort Wainwright, AK. After training with them for several months, his unit was reflagged into the 1st Brigade of the 25th Infantry Division. When this happened, he volunteered for Brigade transfer and im-

tion Iraqi Freedom. He served as a rifleman, a grenadier, a saw gunner, and eventually as a team leader during combat operations in Iraq.

From the moment Cadets arrived at Joint Base Lewis-McChord they were challenged to excel. From the Army Physical Fitness Test held within the first few days of their arrival, to the ultimate challenge of managing a patrol squad in the field as events unfold without warning, our 27 cadets were put

through their paces and evaluated for their fitness to lead American Soldiers.

Every day at LDAC is a day of training. Land Navigation training must be mastered early in the camp cycle for the cadets to be fully successful in the tactical training which follows. A passing score in Land Navigation is a camp-completion criterion.

Confidence Course includes rappel training, the Slide For Life, Log Walk/Rope Drop, and confidence and obstacle courses. Confidence

Training is designed to challenge the cadets' physical courage, build confidence in personal abilities, and helps overcome fear.

Field Leader's Reaction Course is designed to develop and evaluate leadership, and to build teamwork early in the training cycle. Cadets are provided the opportunity to get early feedback on their leadership strengths, weaknesses, styles, and techniques.

In Tactics and Maneuver, the first block of instruction in maneuver at LDAC, cadets learn individual battlefield skills, combat movement techniques and procedures necessary for subsequent tactical training at the squad

level. Maneuver training is a vehicle to teach and evaluate leadership. It introduces conditions of stress that parallel those found in combat. Warrior Forge 2011 also relied heavily on instructors from USAR units from across the country. Units and individuals rotated through two-week assignments to validate training and ensure Army standards were met. Rumors abound of a movement of LDAC to Fort Knox. The Army has yet to say if and when that may happen.

WHAT IS THE GOLD BAR CLUB?

The CCAC established the Gold Bar Club in 2007 as a means to raise money for the Cadet Corps Endowed Scholarship Fund. Membership is open to all CCAC members and alumni of the Corps of Cadets. Since its inception members of the Gold Bar Club have contributed over \$22,00.00 to the scholarship fund.

We currently have only 21 members who contribute almost \$5,000 each year. There is currently \$63,286.68 in the scholarship fund. As you can see, the Gold Bar Club has been a significant contributor of the scholarship fund. The fund allows the CCAC to award two or more scholarships each year. With more members we could do more.

To join all you do is commit to donate a dollar amount for each cadet commissioned through the UTA Corps of Cadets. The dollar amount can be anything from \$5.00 to \$25.00 or more. You can pay at the end of each semester commissioning ceremony or once a year in December. You will receive a statement each semester with the number commissioned along with the bio of those commissioned. You may cancel your commitment at any time or change the amount of your commitment.

The Gold Bar Club has proven to be an excellent way to build up the scholarship fund on a continuing basis and, at the same time, to recognize the cadets who are commissioned. The ROTC program at UTA has a long and proud history, and by becoming a member of the Gold Bar Club you insure that the program will continue to produce outstanding officers for the US Army.
