Greetings to all! The 110th Maverick Battalion is off to a great start! Cadet LTC Ben Carroll, Cadet CSM John Jackson and an outstanding staff of senior cadets took control of the Battalion in early August and are working hard to train and develop our cadets and become a more visible organization on campus. The Fall semester began with 140 cadets enrolled in the program, five MSI's were awarded 4-year National Scholarships and two were awarded 3-year National Scholarships. Over the course of this se-

mester, I expect to award three more 3-year

campus based scholarships. Our Mavericks had a fantastic summer with 23 Cadets attending and successfully completing LDAC at Fort Lewis, WA; two prospective cadets attending and successfully completing the Leader's Training Course at Fort Knox, KY, four cadets attending and successfully completing the Air Assault Course; and two cadets successfully completing the 5-week Intensive Arabic Course. Hall of Honor set for Sunday, February 24, 2013


UTA continues to grow, and so does attendance at the annual Hall of Honor. This year there were no rooms large enough available on a Saturday during February or March. We have chosen to hold the 2013 Hall of Honor on Sunday, February 24, in the University Center on campus. We hope the change from Saturday to Sunday will fit your schedule, and that you will join us starting at 10:30 a.m. for reception and lunch in the Bluebonnet Ballroom when we induct two former cadets into the Hall of Honor.

Our first honoree is **Mr. Al Ellis**. Al came to UTA in

1961 and became the Corps Commander and Commander of the Sam Houston Rifles. He graduated with honors in 1966, was a Distinguished Military Graduate, and was commissioned in the Infantry. He served in the Dominican Republic with the 82nd

Mr. Al Ellis Airborne and in Vietnam as an advisor to the Vietnamese Army. Al resigned his

commission to pursue a law degree at SMU. He has been a trial lawyer for over 40 years and an active member of his profession and community. Some of his leadership roles include: presidencies of the Dallas Bar, Dallas Trial Lawyers, Dallas Association of Young Lawyers, American Board of Trial Advocates, Dallas Council of Alcoholism, Dallas All Sports Association, and tournament director of the Golden Gloves Tournament for 20 years.



COL Archie P. **Davis III**

Davis III (USA, Retired). In 1983, after two years on active duty, he won a 3year ROTC Scholarship, and was released from active duty to pursue an Army commission. Archie was the first African American to serve as the Cadet

Corps Commander. He earned a Business Administration Degree from UTA in December 1986. Some of his later assignments in-

cluded Deputy Director, 13th Financial Management Center, Fort Hood, Texas, and 177th Finance Battalion, Camp Casey, Korea. Colonel Davis served three separate tours of duty in combat including "Operation Desert Shield/Storm," "Operation Iraqi Freedom," and Operation Enduring Freedom." Colonel Davis attended the Senior Service College, earned his Master of Business Administration from University of Phoenix, and a Master of Strategic Studies degree from the United States Army War College. He retired in 2012 and is now a Department of the Army Civilian (GA15) serving as the Director, Financial and Resource Management/Assistant Chief of Staff, G8, U.S. Army Operational Test Command at Fort Hood, Texas. Complete biographies of the honorees will be on dis-

play at the Hall of Honor in February—come see them, and meet the honorees in person.

Memberships do trickle in—most come from former cadets who have served in the Army and are now retired or nearing retirement. But as the rank and file of our membership gets older, we are not replacing them at the same pace. I have proposed including a membership as part of our scholarship awards program for the cadets. My thinking is to get the guys on board, keep in touch, and hope they will become active and involved along the way rather than the traditional 15 or 20 year wait. Those opposing this idea say: Don't give away the membership because we will get the money and involvement down the road.

I have brought up my proposal on two occasions and the motion failed to pass by the Board. So I won't bring it up again during my term on the Board, but I have decided, personally, to direct my own financial contributions for the CCAC specifically to CCAC Lifetime Memberships for some of the deserving cadets, and most likely will let the PMS decide who receives those Lifetime Memberships. I encourage you to also consider this avenue of helping the cadets and the CCAC. Included in this newsletter (page one) is a letter from a new 2LT, which expresses my point far better than I could. This suggestion is not to discourage any monetary contributions to the other programs already in place, but rather to present a method to achieve immediate membership results from our cadets, and hope they have a feeling of inclusion sooner rather than later. 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Where Are They Now

Captain Justin L. Gerron, Class of 2007, is currently serving on active duty. During the summer between his MSII and MSIII years at UTA, he was one of a small group of cadets selected from ROTC units across the country to train with West Point Cadets, preparing him well for ROTC Leadership Training the following summer at Ft. Lewis. While at UTA he was a member of

the Ranger Challenge Team and attended Airborne School and earned his jump wings. He also earned the German Sports Achievement Badge, Gold Award, and subsequently earned the Silver and Bronze awards, so he could say he had all three.

Captain Gerron was commissioned an Engineer Officer in May 200. He reported for active duty and served as a Gold Bar Recruiter until reporting to the Engineer Basic Officers Course at Ft. Leonard Wood, MS. His first assignment as an Engineer Officer was as a Platoon Leader in Ft. Bragg, NC. His platoon was a Vertical and Horizontal Construction Platoon. Their primary focus was to prepare for deployment to Iraq. Just prior to their May 2009 deployment Justin was assigned as the Battalion Construction Officer for a

1100-soldier Task Force located at Joint Base Balad. They planned and coordinated various construction projects for both U.S. forces and Iraqi units. Two months prior to his unit's scheduled redeployment he was assigned to the Redeployment Center in Kuwait to handle the processing of the unit's equipment for the trip back to Fort Bragg. There he than had an opportunity to attend Pathfinder and Jumpmaster Courses, and he received his Torch and Senior Jump wings. Justin decided on a future as an Explosive Ordnance

Disposal Officer. He applied for and was accepted to attend the Pre-EOD Course at Redstone Arsenal in Alabama. Upon graduation he attended the US Naval EOD School at Eglin AFB, Florida. He found the course to be extremely challenging and the dropout rate very high, but he graduated in April 2012 earning the distinguished EOD Badge. Captain Gerron is currently attending the Combined Logistics Captains Career Course at Ft. Lee, VA. After graduation he will attend Pre-Ranger Training, hoping to be selected to attend Ranger School. His next assignment is as an EOD Officer at Fort Drum, NY.

Captain Gerron is an avid skydiver and scuba diver. He has earned 2 Army Commendation Medals and 2 Army Achievement Medals, as well as other service ribbons. He has accomplished a lot in his short career, and we wish him continued success!
