point increase in the overall battalion average, they have implemented a new format for squad—and platoon level training that is paying dividends in domain knowledge,


confidence, and tactical competence across all MS levels, and they have become a much, much more visible organization on campus. This Spring we will resume Jodie Encampments on campus!

Medal of Honor Parade Saturday April 12, 2014

Gainesville Texas has been designated as an official Medal of Honor City. The CCAC, members of the UTA Corps of Cadets, and other military personal connected with UTA are invited to participate in the MEDAL OF HONOR PARADE in Gainesville, Texas on April 12, 2014.

For the last 10 years the North Texas Corvette Club (NTCC a big supported of the CCAC) has participated in the event honoring those living members who have received our nation's highest military honor—the Congressional Medal of Honor. We have **tentatively** been selected to lead the parade. This is **not** a done deal but looks likely. All plans and specific details relating to the Corps of Cadets are subject to the approval of the PMS, Col Rimmer.

Taps...



Major Retired Ronald Lee Paramore died on November 22, 2013. He was born in Duncan, OK, on June 12, 1940. Ronald was commissioned in the U.S. Army in 1965 and served two tours in Vietnam. He received a Slver Star, two Bronze Stars and two Purple Hearts. Ronald was highly active in veterans' communities in the Dallas/Fort Worth area. Ronald is survived by his wife of 49 years, Judy, his son, Scott Paramore, and three grandchildren.

Commander Glenn Edward Simmons, a retired U.S. Navy Commander, died on Oct. 15, 2013, at the age of 93. He attended NTAC in 1941. He entered the Naval Reserve Midshipman School at Northwestern

University in Chicago, IL, but resigned his commission, began flight school, and received his wings in April 1942. He entered World War II as an aviator of PBYs in the Aleutian Islands. Simmons' Naval career spanned World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the Cold War. His last duty was as director of the Defense Intelligence School in Washington, D.C. He retired in 1969 after 28 years of service.
