Greetings from the Maverick Battalion! The **113th Maverick Battalion** finished off an excellent semester and year, and our cadets are working hard over the summer to return ready to step up into their new responsibilities. There have been several highlights this semes-

ter, but the Maverick Commando competition, Hall of Honor, and Joint Field Training eXercise at Camp Wolters, with nearly 300 cadets and cadre, probably top the list. I would like to highlight the inaugural

Maverick Commando competition, which began on a cold Saturday morning in February with cadet volunteers laying out equipment for inspection, continued with a 6-mile road march to different stations where the cadets completed military tasks, and finished with teams constructing one-rope bridges and transporting themselves and their equipment across a water obstacle. Army ROTC Hall of Fame

MG Willard Latham was inducted into the UTA Military Science Hall of Honor in 1988, the first induction year. Judge Don Stevenson was inducted in 2009. Both are Life Members of the CCAC. We are proud to announce that the US Army Cadet Command has selected UTA alumni Major General Will Latham, Ret. and Judge Donald J. Stevenson for the inaugural class of the newly created Army ROTC Hall of Fame.

The US Army created the Hall of Fame this year in honor of the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC)'s 100th anniversary. The inaugural ceremony was on June 10th at Fort Knox, where the Hall of Fame will be located.

UTA President Vistasp Karbhari nominated the two with input from the CCAC. Cadet Command set the following criteria for nomination and selection. Each university or college par-

ticipating in the ROTC program could nominate two individuals using the following criteria: One nominee was to be a career military officer with a record of distinguished service. The other nominee was to be an individual who left the service, but went on to have a distinguished civilian career in industry, academia, community service, etc.

There are 273 Army ROTC programs around the US, so the selection of MG Latham and Judge Stevenson reflects well on their individual achievements, and on UTA's ROTC program. This was the inaugural "class" covering 100 years of ROTC's existence, so there were 326 inductees (including 40 inducted posthumously). Future classes will be much smaller, perhaps less than 5 per year.

CCAC Awards: New Life Member Travis Crook was the recipient of the Preston A Weatherred Award. CCAC Scolarship recipients were Cadets Jacob Mason and Cadesha Mitchell. **Cadet Corps Alumni Council Financial Report** This financial report is as of 5 March 2016. The CCAC has three funds, listed below.

- The Endowed Scholarship Fund (ESF): Interest from this fund provides scholarships for cadets. The value of the ESF as of 5 March 2016 was \$104,441.72 (book) and \$107,738.62 (market). After the projected 4th quarter distribution in August of 2016, the ESF will have \$4,654.30 in interest distributions. At its 4 March meeting, the CCAC Executive Committee passed a motion to allow \$4,500.00 for scholarships to be awarded in May of 2016. At the March 2016 Hall of Honor, members contributed \$900 to the fund's principal. The principal means of raising funds for the ESF, however, is The Gold Bar Program. Gold Bar Club members have given over \$38,000 for the Endowed Scholarship Fund since its inception. There are less than 18 Gold Bar Members, and we welcome additional members. A membership application is included as part of this *Reveille* issue.
- *The Life Membership Fund (LMF)*: Interest from this fund supports the Military Science Department in a variety of ways that include recruiting, publicity, website, awards and events. The value of the LMF as of March 2016 was \$98,622.76 (book) and \$90,824.68 (market). The CCAC has completed the \$50,000 donation requirement to secure matching funds from the Maverick Match Program. The match for the most recently deposited funds will be made at the end of the next quarter (May 31), bringing the total book value of the fund to more than \$100,000.
- *The Operating Fund*: Used to deal with CCAC expenses. As of Dec. 31, 2015, the fund was \$2,334.84.
