The recent opening of the **National Museum of African American History & Culture** recognizes the contributions and challenges faced by one group of our fellow Americans. In that regard, former **President George W. Bush**, who signed the bill to create the museum, made a speech at the museum's opening from which the following comment are extracted:

"In a society governed by the people, no wrong lasts forever. After struggle and sacrifice, the American people, acting through the most democratic of means, amended the constitution that originally treated slaves as three-fifths of a person, to guarantee equal protection of the laws. After a decade of struggle, civil rights acts and voting rights act were finally enacted. Even today, the journey toward justice is still not complete. But this museum will inspire us to go farther and get there faster."

"Our country is better and more vibrant because of the contributions of millions of African Americans. No telling of American history is either complete or accurate without acknowledging them. The lesson in this museum is

that all Americans share a past and a future by staying true to our principles, righting injustice, and encouraging the empowerment of all. We will be an even greater nation for generations to come."

CCAC members attending UTA in the 1960s witnessed firsthand the righting of one injustice when African Americans were enrolled for the first time. In that regard, we want to recognize **Oscar K. Chambers**, the first African American graduate who was commissioned from UTA in August 1965, and all the African American alumni who followed him. We are all Americans, and as CCAC alumni, we are united by a special bond of service to our country.
