It has been an exciting spring and early summer with the Hall of Honor, the May commissioning of ten new Second Lieutenants, and the April scholarship awards to include two CCAC scholarships totaling \$5,000. In conversations with fellow CCAC members, I'm reminded that many members worked their way through college and came from less-than-privileged backgrounds. In fact, some were the first in their family or in the second generation to graduate

college. Many of today's cadets are in the same situation and that's why former CCAC president Ray Andrae created the Gold Bar Club in 2007 to provide CCAC scholarships.

John (Hendew) Henderson's article provides some details on the program's results. Contributions are **tax deductible** and administrated by the Univ. of Texas system. Although one pledges an amount of one's choosing for each cadet commissioned, the pledge may be changed or cancelled whenever personal circumstances dictate. For example, the program commissions between 20 to 25 cadets a year. At \$2 a cadet that is a total of \$40 or \$50 a year. That's about what you would spend on a meal for two at an inexpensive restaurant. I encourage all CCAC members to join and to "give back" and help worthy cadets who were in the same situation as many of us "back in the day."

Many other Texans have been awarded our country's highest honor, but Audie Murphy, from Hunt County near Greenville, Texas, is probably the most well-known. So, when Rex requested a story about the Medal of Honor, like all journalists, I wanted to do some firsthand research. The end of the forest in Holtzwihr, France, seemed to be a good place to start. That is where Company B. 15th Regiment, of the 3rd Infantry

It was emotional and certainly an eerie feeling to stand in the exact spot where 2LT Murphy ordered his remaining 19 men (from 120) to fall back while he continued to fight single-handedly against heavy odds. A wounded

Member News and a Little Advice From Former Cadet Foley Rovello Hart

After graduating from UTA May of 2012 with a BS in Psychology, Foley Rovello Hart attended the Engineer Basic Officer Leader Course class 13-12 and graduated in March of 2013. Shortly after graduation, she reported to the 19th Engineer Battalion out of Fort Knox, KY. There she was slotted as a Horizontal Platoon Leader for the 15th EN CO and deployed to Camp Arifjan, Kuwait in late 2013. A couple of days before she landed, Kuwait saw its largest flood in over 50 years. The majority of the construction battalion's mission was the rebuilding of Camp Arifjan and the surrounding area.



Foley went on to a staff position as the Contracting Officer for the Battalion. Due to removal of key leadership positions within one of the Companies, she had the unique opportunity to serve again as a Platoon Leader for a vertical platoon, the 76th EN CO. She redeployed with the 76th and came back to serve as the Executive Officer for the 502d MRBC (Multi-Role Bridge Company). After a year, she went on maternity leave for the birth of her first child, and returned to serve in her final staff position(s) in the battalion as the Property Book Officer and S4, due to low manning. Though the roles

were challenging at times, she learned quite a bit about the property and logistics behind command. Foley pinned Captain in May 2016 and was assigned to Fort Leonard Wood, MO, where she is now an instructor at EBOLC (Engineer Basic Officer Leader Course), currently serving as the General Engineering Chief of EBOLC, overseeing all construction engineering modules, and is an instructor for the Horizontal engineer section. Foley is slotted to attend Captain's Career Course in April 2018 and graduate with her Master's in Social Work in May of 2018.

A Note to Cadets From Foley: Every position I held has been of such benefit to me, and I wish that I could articulate all of my lessons learned in a few short sentences. But it is the journey that teaches you more than lesson plans and books. If you had asked me after my first year as a 2LT, I would have said I am not cut out for this Army thing; however, looking back now I feel so blessed to have been part of the Army even for my short 5 years. I hope that the Cadets at UTA are excited, not to tackle the world with what they think "right looks like," like a bull in a china shop, but to keep an open mind and approach all challenges with optimism and respect as they learn from each position they hold. Leadership is so much more than theories, and without seeing both the good and bad leaders you can't truly appreciate and identify the qualities that will shape your own unique leadership style. Know your soldiers and know yourself, and you will be alright.

Our next event will be the CCAC Executive Committee meeting in the 6th floor "Parlor" of the UTA Library, at I 1:00 a.m. August 24. **All CCAC members are welcome to attend.** This will be followed by our attendance at the fall Maverick Battalion Cadet Orientation & Barbeque on the afternoon of August 24 in the E.H. LT Murphy held off the six German tanks and reduced their 100 or so infantry soldiers while on a burning tank using the M-48 tankmounted machine gun and calling in artillery. For his gallantry, Audie Murphy was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.







To finish the story, a quick trip to Washington, D.C. to get a picture of the Old Guard and Major Murphy's gravestone at Arlington National Cemetery provided the necessary information and pictures.

Those Americans in uniform, with achievements equal to Murphy's bravery, are honored each year at the Medal of Honor Parade in Gainesville, Texas. UTA Military Science Cadets and members of the CCAC have proudly participated for the past five years. This year we had most of the usual suspects and even added a few more. Mark Stevens flew in from Seattle to command the CCAC Team this year, and we even did a few parade movements with the current drill team along the parade route.
