2018 Hall of Honor on Saturday, March 24 at 3:00 p.m.

The CCAC Hall of Honor team has been at work since August preparing for the 2018 Hall of Honor. Many of you may not know that the Hall of Honor is a major leadership and training exercise for the Corps of Cadets. General guidance is provided to the Corps Commander at a joint CCAC/Military Science Department planning meeting in January. The Corps Commander and staff develop their plan and began preparations. An in-process review in early March addresses all aspects of the Hall of Honor. Cadet rehearsals are scheduled, and the cadets have a final rehearsal and setup on Saturday morning.

The 2018 Hall of Honor is scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 3:00 in the University Center's Rosebud Theater. Convenient parking will be in the lot just north of University Center. Registration and check-in begin at 2:30 in the foyer outside the theater for the 3:00 start. Following the induction of the three selected honorees, the Hall of Honor continues with a retreat ceremony at the flagpole in front of the library, followed by a reception in the newly decorated Learning Center back at the University Center. Current and alumni Sam Houston Rifles will perform, and alumni can meet informally with cadets in all extra-curricular programs. The official program will continue with dinner at 5:30 in the Bluebonnet Ballroom and conclude by 7:00. Finally, there will be an opportunity to visit informally until around 8:00. We certainly hope you can join us and be a part of this great event.

2018 Hall of Honor Inductees



LTC Mark Latham (Ret, USA) came to UTA in 1972. He was a member of the Sam Houston Rifles and was the Corps Commander

his senior year. He graduated in 1976. After a tour in Germany, he completed the Armor Advanced Course and transitioned to Special Forces. He completed Command and General Staff College and Spanish Language Training. He finished his Army career with high-level staff positions in Washington, D.C. and Europe. After retirement in 2004, he taught at the Command and General Staff College for two years. Retiring from that, he worked as a substitute school teacher and assistant funeral director. Mark plays the bagpipe for various activities in the local area and for CCAC activities. He is a member of the CCAC board and lives in Arlington with his wife Seba. He has two sons.



LTC Max Manifold enlisted in the Army in 1940. He fought across Europe with the famed 2nd Ranger Battalion, receiving a Silver Star for his actions during

the Battle of the Bulge. He served in five major campaigns, including behind enemy lines during the Korean conflict. In Vietnam he was assigned to the famed Korean "Tiger Division." In 1960 he joined the Military Science Department at Arlington State College. He developed a reputation as someone that you need to listen to. He also was the cadre sponsor for the Sam Houston Rifle Drill Team. Major Manifold was an inspiration and mentor to cadets. He exemplified outstanding leadership qualities, set high standards, and demanded adherence to those standards. After retirement in 1968. LTC Manifold was a Veteran Counselor for a federal program and a Disabled Veterans Counselor for the Texas Employment Commission.



LTC Lora A. Rimmer (Ret, USA) graduated from the University of Kansas in 1993 and was commissioned in the Signal Corps. Her Signal Corps assignments included one

tour in Kuwait and one in Iraq. In May 2011 she became the Professor of Military Science at the University of Texas at Arlington. She developed an envious track record as a trainer, educator, coach, mentor and role model, and was named the Military Science Professor of the Year in 2014, out of a pool of 275 highly qualified candidates across the United States. She developed excellent relationships with the UTA faculty and staff, and her outreach with the local community increased awareness of Army ROTC and its benefits. She retired in 2015 and started a successful small business instructing yoga in Kansas. She is a full-time mom for her son, Ian Rimmer, a sixth-grader.

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Gold Bar Club

It started in 2007 with 19 former cadets from the various Arlington, Texas, Military Science programs. They pledged to furnish financial support to existing and future cadets following in their footsteps. In the last issue of Reveille #45, October 2017, there is a detailed accounting of the growth of that idea and tradition.

Let's just review a few of those facts. The number of cadets commissioned as 2nd LTs each year has varied. That first year (2007) UTA commissioned 17, and the 19 original Gold Bar Club contributors donated \$4,010.00. While the number and names on the Gold Bar list have also varied over time, from 19 to 24 members, the core number has not changed much.

In 2017, the eleventh year, UTA commissioned 17 new 2nd LTs, and 21 contributors donated \$3,530.00, and raised the combined total to \$45,290.00.

Some would say this has been a remarkable accomplishment, and that would be true. But with the help of every one of the CCAC members together, we could take a giant leap forward for the cadets who are following us.

If each of us would make a tax-deductible donation of only one dollar per each new 2nd LT commissioned by the UTA Military Science Department in 2017, our \$17.00 donation would raise the above total by \$3,179.00 to \$48,469.00.

That does make a difference! Almost Doubles the 2017 **donation.** You might want to do this for 2018 only, just to "try it on," that's fine. But, if you like the feeling making a difference in a cadet's life and future, and wish to become a Gold Bar Club member, just let us know.

CCAC Financial Report Ken Smith, VP Finances

Your CCAC is financially sound and maintains steady growth; all contributions go to support the Military Science Department, the cadets, and programs. All values are as of 11-30-2017.

The Endowed Scholarship Fund (ESF): Interest from this fund provides scholarships for the cadets. Book value is \$124,795.31 and market value is \$144.165.37. Total annual interest is \$4,128.46. The Gold Bar Program (see Hendew's column) is the primary means of fundraising for the ESF; I encourage council members to become active contributors. There was a total of \$4,500 spent in scholarships this semester.

The Life Membership Fund (LMF): Interest from this fund supports the Military Science Department in a variety of ways, such as recruiting, publicity, website, awards and events. As a reminder, most corporations and companies have dollar-for-dollar matching contributions, so check with your employer to take advantage of those programs. Book value is \$106,880.22 and market value is \$112,237.71. Total annual interest is \$5,202.58.

The Operating Fund (OF): funds CCAC expenses such as the Hall of Honor. The OF is currently at \$4,531.83.

The CCAC provides a written account of its finances at the Hall of Honor every year. Copies are available.

Once the CCAC receives the donation, it will be forwarded to the UTA Development Office, and the donor will receive an acknowledgment of the tax-deductible donation for their tax records.

He was respected by all who knew him. He was one of the first inductees into UTA's Military Science Hall of Honor when it was established in 1980.

Douglas Dulaney passed away on December 11, 2017. Doug lived out the majority of his life in Texas. He went to Arlington State College and worked for General Motors. He had a passion for photography and enjoyed taking photos of his family. He was a big supporter of the Jodies and the Sam Houston Rifles throughout his life.

Candy Poole Phillips died December 22, 2017. Candy was the wife of CCAC member Bill Phillips (attended UTA in '65). Candy was a long time Woman's Missionary Union (WMU) leader and supported missionary work locally, nationally, and globally. She and Bill met at Six Flags Over Texas where she was a French Riverboat Girl, and he a Confederate Soldier. They lived in Tennessee, where Bill still lives.
