CCAC Financial Report Ken Smith, VP Finances

Your CCAC is financially sound and continues with steady growth; more contributions equal more support to the Military Science Department and more significant help to the cadet programs. (All values shown below, except Market values, are as of June 13, 2018.)

The Endowed Scholarship Fund (ESF): Interest from this fund provides scholarships for cadets: Book Value is \$133,822.93 (9K increase from Jan 2018) and Market Value is \$155,839.47 (11K increase from Jan 2018). The Gold Bar Program is the primary means of fund raising for the ESF; I encourage more council members to become active contributors, as only about 25 alumni members are active contributors. All contributions are tax deductible if made out to UTA and are in accordance with current tax law; the process is simple and website-based.

There was a total of \$4,500.00 spent in scholarships to date; more awards from the Spring Semester have yet to be posted.

The **Life Membership Fund (LMF)**: Interest from this fund supports the Military Science Department in a variety of ways, such as recruiting, publicity, website, awards, and events. As a reminder, most corporations and companies have dollar-for-dollar matching contributions, so check with your employer to take advantage of those programs. Book Value is \$107,792.72 (\$917.00 increase from Jan 2018) and Market Value is \$115,960.13 (3.7K increase).

The **Operating Fund (OF)**: funds CCAC expenses. Fund is currently at \$4,478.86.

The **Hall of Honor 2018** was another success; a profit of about \$1,200.00 was realized this year.

You are invited! August 23rd is the Military Science Department's **Orientation Day and Cadet Barbecue**, and there will be a **CCAC Executive Committee** meeting. All CCAC members are invited to both events. Come outto support the Maverick Battalion.

The CCAC Executive Committee will meet from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the 6th floor Parlor of the UTA Library. We welcome all CCAC members to this Board meeting. Then, join us in the University Center to welcome the incoming freshman and their parents, and for BBQ after the orientation program. The battalion conducted its final foot march of the semester during morning physical training the week before semester exams. The foot march was 8.4 miles long with 35-pound rucksacks. The time-standard was a 20-minute mile. The intent of the foot marches was for physical conditioning, but also to prepare the MS IIIs for Summer Camp, where they must complete a mandatory 12-mile foot march in 4 hours with a 35-pound rucksack.

Davis Hall or Brazos House—Remembered

Farewell to an old friend and unforgettable memories. While there are many memories recounted in our CCAC website (including this report by Col. Tal Anderson) what some of us thought would never happen is actually going to happen—Davis Hall/Brazos House will be a thing of the past. Only a couple of the old inhabitants of Davis Hall, Tal Anderson and Hendew showed up at the farewell party, but it was still an appropriate send off. The building was historically a military dorm, and many a soldier had some formative years there before going off to serve our country. The building was unique, both in structure and as one of the oldest buildings on campus. The inside was very military in looks—bunk beds, metal desks, and even sinks with faucets that sprung back to the off position to avoid wasting water. Lots of memories and mysteries within those walls. Read more about some of the history, the fables and legends of Davis Hall on the CCAC website at https://utaccac.org/stories-and-legends, Tal's account:

"There were only two of us at Saturday's farewell to Brazos House who had lived there when it was Davis Hall which was the military dorm for ROTC cadets. Each ramp had a senior cadet who was 'Ramp Commander'. There were rooms on all floors of each ramp

except for A ramp where there was 'day room/office' in the first room on the right on first floor. Rooms had metal bunk beds and THIN mattresses, one wooden table for studying, and a metal dresser. The single closet was very small and we filled it with mostly military uniforms. There was little room for civilian clothes. Our military shoes and boots, and civilian shoes had to be 'spit-shined and aligned' underneath the bunk bed. Senior cadets

could do unannounced inspections of freshmen cadets to ensure our rooms, clothing, and shoes were kept orderly and clean. Freshmen had 'study hours' from 7 pm or 7:30 pm to 9:30 pm where we were required to be at our

study table. At 9:30 pm (2130 hours military time), we were free to do personal things if we didn't need additional study time. At 2300 hours (11:00 pm), a military bugle played TAPS and lights had to be turned off, unless a cadet requested and got approval for 'late lights' for the purpose of continued studying. We learned discipline, respect for authority, and how to have an organized lifestyle. Those of you who didn't experience this likely think we were all crazy to tolerate this kind of regimentation in college. The result of this regimentation was that the majority of us who lived in Davis Hall went on to have highly successful military or civilian careers, OR BOTH. I served on Active Duty for 28 plus years and retired as a Colonel, as did many of my Davis Hall peers.

This is long but I thought that those of you who loved Brazos House needed to know the history of the old building before it was Brazos House. I made lifelong friends there just as many of you did. I met my wife of 54 years at a homecoming float building party behind Davis Hall. I too have lots of great memories just as you former Brazos residents do. Best wishes to all who occupied the old dorm, regardless of when..."

This leads us to a new program the CCAC is running up the flag pole: A Mentorship Program for the cadets with alumni assistance. It is no secret that UTA Military Alumni generally excel in any career they choose—Military, Civilian, Law, Medical, Government Service, or Entrepreneur in a myriad of areas. With today's level of communication, distance is not a factor as it relates to becoming a mentor. Just your willingness to help, guide, consult, or counsel.

While we are still in the discussion stage with Rex, new CCAC President Jerry B. Houston, VP-Membership Diane Colvard, LTC Doty, and some of the cadets, one of the first steps is to hear from you if this concept rings your bell. This will NOT be one of those things like CCAC member Al Ellis does, where every waking moment is devoted to serving the less fortunate, but rather some advice or counseling to a cadet who has a question relating to an area where you are an expert or have extensive knowledge based on your experience. Don't short change your knowledge.

The first step is to let us know if you are willing to participate. If we get enough folks who hold up their hands, we will move to the next step in organization, which will probably be a list of the areas where you think your specific knowledge will be helpful. We will make the list of areas available to the cadets and, if there is a match, they will contact you by email. Military career is certainly one area, but other subjects, like investments, website development, career advice (to include second careers after military service), and even gender-specific issues could be discussed with folks like Diane Colvard, Sue Tillotson, Jeanne Deakyne, Lora Rimmer, or others. (OK, I haven't talked to these ladies, but I believe they would be happy to assist.)

FIREARM TRAINING

The subject of guns generally falls along political lines, and Politics is an off-limit subject for the *Reveille*.

So, lets put this in perspective of "Facts and Opinion," and your comments and opinions are welcome.

First, some of the FACTS: I have been a Certified Firearms Instructor for the Texas Department of Public Safety and the NRA since the program began some 25 years ago. I was the founder of the Texas CHL Instructors Association, which has some 2,000 members, and I have certified and licensed over 2,500 students, so I believe I am knowledgeable on the subject of guns and the right to carry.

The State of Texas mandates the subject matter of the LI-CENSE TO CARRY Program (LTC—formerly CHL) to include Gun Safety, Gun Laws, License Requirements, Where you are allowed and not allowed to Carry, and Non-Violent

Problem Resolution. You must pass a written test as well as a proficiency test. Your Texas LTC is currently valid in 38 other states. You must pass both a federal and state background check. A felony on your record or a class A or B misdemeanor (with some exceptions) will prevent you from getting an LTC. So, essentially, criminals are not legally allowed to obtain a License to Carry. Those states and areas with the most stringent gun laws, statistically, have the most gun-related crimes. An AR-15 or a Glock Pistol are not assault weapons. The number of guns you possess does not relate to crime statistics any more than the number of coins or stamps in your collection. Almost all gun-law violations are committed by unlicensed persons with depression or mental issues. A legally licensed person is allowed to carry a gun on a college campus (with some exceptions), but it must be concealed. These are facts—not opinions.

Now, some opinions. A trained and licensed person with a gun is safer than a person who is not trained and licensed. We, as citizens, have a right to defend ourselves and third persons. (actually, that is the law). Why we "need" an AR-15 or a semi-automatic pistol is the same reason as why we "need" a Lexus instead of a Honda (and BTW, statistically, the car is far more dangerous than the gun). Those who do not know the difference between a clip and a magazine are not knowledgeable about guns. Again, your comments and opinions are welcome—as long as we keep politics out of the discussion.

So, in keeping with the mission of the CCAC—to help and mentor cadets—and with the blessing of the PMS, I have conducted a free LTC class for those cadets who are 21 and wish to obtain their LTC. And I believe that those going into the Armed Services should know something about firearms. We tried to make the class fun, yet cover all the requirements of the state.
