The CCAC participated in a very successful cadet orientation and barbeque as the school year at UTA began. Our new Professor of Military Science, Maj (P) Bonnie Belobrajdic, has taken charge and is moving the Maverick Battalion forward with enthusiasm and purpose. She did brief the CCAC Board of Directors about her

plans for the future, and we are very excited. Today's ROTC is very different from the ROTC many of us experienced when we were cadets. UTA is one of 274 host col-

leges across the country. There are over 700 other colleges that plug into host colleges. UTA is the host college for the University of North Texas (an Extension University) and eight crosstown campuses: University of Texas at Dallas, University of Dallas, Texas Women's University, Southern Methodist University, Dallas Baptist University, Tarrant County College, and Collin County College. These colleges and universities are collectively known as the Maverick Battalion.

The summer camp that you and I remember is also changing. They just added another week to the original six weeks, which will now include two weeks in the field. It is now called Cadet Summer Training (CST) and is all conducted at Fort Knox. There are close to 10,000 cadets that will go through CST next year. There will be over 4,500 cadre supporting the effort. I mention this because the results of CST have a significant impact on a cadet's future in the Army. This means a lot of time and effort is focused by the Military Science Department in preparing MSIII cadets for summer camp. It is exciting to see the transformation of cadets as they develop through the program. We, as alumni, are fortunate to be a part of the Maverick Battalion.

The Cowboys and the Rangers still stand during the National Anthem. Texas commissioned more military officers in WWII than all the Military Academies combined. Our own military alumni have marched in the Annual Medal of Honor Parade in Gainesville, Texas for the last 8 years. And Texas is the home of 1.8 million Veterans—many living in the 4<sup>th</sup>-largest metroplex in the country. An excellent choice by all standards.

She is an Army Aviator who has held numerous leadership positions to include Company XO and Platoon Leader in B/1-158<sup>th</sup> AVN REGT at Fort Hood, TX; Company Commander for Alpha Company, 3-25 AVN REGT in Iraq; Company Commander for Alpha Company 2-25 Aviation Regiment at Wheeler Army Airfield in Hawaii, then Rear Detachment Commander for 2-25 Aviation Regiment at Wheeler Army Airfield. She has held multiple staff positions from the battalion to Corps level-Corps Air Operation Planning in Baghdad, Iraq; BN Executive Officer during Operation Atlantic Resolve; BN Operations Planner at Fort Bliss, TX, and BDE Executive Officer at Fort Bliss, TX and during Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan. She also served in the Pentagon as a Junior Military Assistant for the Secretary of Defense's Executive Secretariat, as an Advance Travel Planner for the Secretary of Defense and on the Army Staff as a Transformation

Officer.

Major Belobrajdic has also attained her MBA and a Masters in Policy Management from Georgetown University. She is married to LTC (Ret) Paul Belobrajdic.

### **CCAC Financial Report**

Your CCAC continues to be financially sound and growing. All contributions are tax-deductible—if made out to UTA—and are in accordance with current tax law; the process is simple and website-based. As we approach the end of the calendar year, now would be a good time to round out your contribution for the year. All values except Market values are as of August 31, 2019. These figures are estimates and will be adjusted as accounting for the end of UTA's fiscal year (ending August 31, 2019) is not complete.

The Endowed Scholarship Fund (ESF): Interest from this fund provides scholarships for cadets: Book Value is \$153,795 and Market Value is \$176,909.

The Gold Bar Program is the primary means of fundraising for the ESF; I encourage more members to become active contributors—only about 19 members are current contributors. A total of 18 new Lieutenants were commissioned in the last year from all ROTC programs. The **Life Membership Fund (LMF):** Interest from this fund supports the Military Science Department in a variety of ways, such as recruiting, publicity, website, awards, and events. As a reminder, most corporations and companies have dollar-for-dollar matching contributions, so check with your employer to take advantage of those programs. **Book value is \$110,825** and **Market Value is \$119,163**.


