Make plans to attend the UTA Military Science Hall of Honor and luncheon on Saturday the 4th of March.

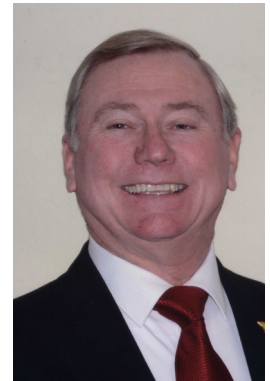

As we begin another year, let me remind you of the first of our twofold mission: To provide necessary support to the Corps of Cadets and the Military Science Department of The University of Texas at Arlington to maintain a truly outstanding program to develop future leaders of the U.S. Army.

We are living in very turbulent times. There is not a time in recent history that has been so potentially dangerous. Russia is waging an unlawful and

unprovoked war on the sovereign country of Ukraine while China, with an economy nearly equal in size to ours, is building a world-class military to challenge us and threaten its neighbors. Introducing Dr. Jennifer Cowley

Dr. Jennifer Cowley is the first female president of The University of Texas at Arlington and the 10th overall. She is also a professor of public affairs and planning in the College of Architecture, Planning, and Public Affairs.

Dr. Cowley has dedicated her career to public service. Before joining UT Arlington, she was the provost and vice president for academic affairs at The University of North Texas, where she led economic development partnerships, advanced diversity and inclusion initiatives, fostered student success, bolstered the research portfolio, and helped increase enroll-

ment. She worked at The Ohio State University for 16 years, serving as the vice provost for capital planning and regional campuses, associate dean of the College of Engineering, head of city and regional planning, and a professor during her time there. While at OSU, Dr. Cowley also led four regional campuses, helped develop the President's and Provost's Teaching Institute to aid faculty in improving teaching quality and advancing effectiveness, and created a capital plan that led to more than \$1 billion in development over a five-year period.

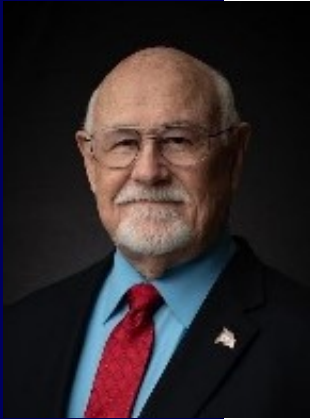
Prior to entering academia, Dr. Cowley worked in city

government in Amarillo and College Station. She earned a Ph.D. in urban and regional science, a master's degree in urban planning, a bachelor's degree in political science from Texas A&M University and master's degrees in interdisciplinary studies, and public administration from UNT. She is a fellow of American Institute of Certified Planners and a member of the executive committee of the Council on Academic Affairs in the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities.

An Arlington native, Dr. Cowley and her husband, Jon, have a high-school-age son, Nathan, and a pet chinchilla named Chinchi.

Hall of Honor 2023 Inductees

Major (Ret) James (Jim) Tomlin



Major (Ret) James (Jim) Tomlin will be inducted into the Military Science Hall of Honor in recognition of his distinguished career and service to the nation as a lifelong leader as an officer in the active Army and contractor in the Defense Industry.

James grew up in Ft. Worth. Upon graduation from Amon Carter Riverside High School in 1959, he enrolled in Arlington State College (UTA) and ROTC where he served on the Battalion Staff, guide on the Sam Houston Rifles (three years); and leadership of the

NCO and Officers Clubs. He graduated in 1963 as a Distinguished Military Graduate with a bachelor's degree in Business Management and was commissioned an Infantry Officer in the active Army. He served in Infantry, Aviation, and Military Intelligence assignments throughout his 20 year career that included two tours in Vietnam, as well as other military assignments of increased responsibility to include S.H.A.P.E. Headquarters in Europe. He spent 33 years as a defense contractor. His aviation, intel, and operations expertise extended across a broad

spectrum of programs and systems from drones, C-17 aircraft, B-2 Bomber, Army robotic ground vehicles, Marine Corps amphibious vehicles, armored personnel carriers, and missile and air defense systems.

He is married to Annette who was a Sam Houston Rifles sweetheart in 1963; they currently reside in Grand Prairie, Texas. They have 2 daughters, 5 grandsons, 1 granddaughter, and 1 great-grandson on the way. He is a Life Member of the CCAC.

Theron Ray Arrington



Theron Ray Arrington will be inducted into the Military Science Hall of Honor in recognition of his distinguished career, and service to the nation as officer in the active Army and valued member and leader in his community.

Theron grew up in Fort Worth and was a 1959 graduate of North Side High School. He earned a two-year scholarship from General Dynamics and enrolled at Arlington State College (UTA) and the ROTC program. He took the Army's Pilot Training Program dur-

ing his third year of ROTC at ASC. By his senior year, Cadet LTC Arrington had served as a member of the Rifle Team, spent four years as a member of the Sam Houston Rifles Drill Team (Commander in his third year) and was selected as Battalion Commander his senior year.

He was a Distinguished Military Graduate in 1963, with a bachelor of business administration with major in business management and marketing and was commissioned a second lieutenant

in the Signal Corps.

Although commissioned a Signal Officer, his primary specialty was as Aviation Officer, with a secondary specialty as Combat Signal. He was both a fixed-wing (seven different aircraft) and rotary-wing (two helicopters) aviator, with over 2,000 combat flying hours. He served two tours in Vietnam. His 15-year military career also included a tour as flight instructor and duty assignments at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey; Headquarters U.S. Forces Tokyo,

Japan; and Fort Hood, Texas.

After his Honorable Discharge in 1978, Arrington settled in Killeen, Texas, and established Arrington

Termite and Pest Control. He and his wife Linda have been married for 43 years. They have two children and three grandchildren. He remains a strong supporter of the Corps of Cadets and

Cadet Corps Alumni Council and has been a Life Member since 2003.

CPT (Ret) Paul Kim



CPT (Ret) Paul Kim will receive an Honorary induction into the Military Science Hall of Honor for his dedicated service to the nation, the UTA Military Science Department, and the Cadet Corps of the Maverick Battalion.

Paul was born in Irving, Texas. He graduated from Aledo High School and enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserve from 2005 to 2011. Paul graduated from The University of Oklahoma with a bachelor's degree in History in 2011. He also earned a master's degree from Columbus State University. He commissioned Infantry in 2011. Schools attended in service were Infantry Officers Basic Course, Airborne and Ranger Schools, Maneuver Captain's Career Course, and Bradley Fighting Vehicle Course.

In his years of service, he served as a Platoon Leader, Company Executive Officer, Administrative Battalion Staff Officer, Logistics Battalion Staff Officer, and Assistant Operations Brigade Staff Officer. He served with the 82nd Airborne in Iraq. Paul was medically retired from active duty in 2017. He joined the UTA ROTC Cadre as the MSII Instructor from 2019 to 2022.

Additional duties at UTA included Contracting Officer, Scholarship and Housing Officer, and Military History Instructor. He helped cadets through college, assisting them with personal issues and in understanding their potential. He went the extra mile by teaching Military History to cadets at Maverick Battalion extension schools of UNT and TWU, without additional compensation for time and travel.

After the Russian invasion of Ukraine began on Feb. 24, 2022, Mr. Kim left the ROTC department, joined the International Legion of Territorial Defense in August amidst the start of Ukraine's counterattack, and acquired full serviceman status.

Paul Kim was a man of many talents. He was a man of God in the Catholic faith, loved puns, consumed food like a prized competitive eater. To the Corps of the Cadets of the Maverick Battalion and the Cadre at UTA and UNT, he was a leader, a mentor, and a respected friend who is missed greatly. CPT Paul Kim was killed in Mykolaiv, Ukraine, on Oct. 5, 2022.



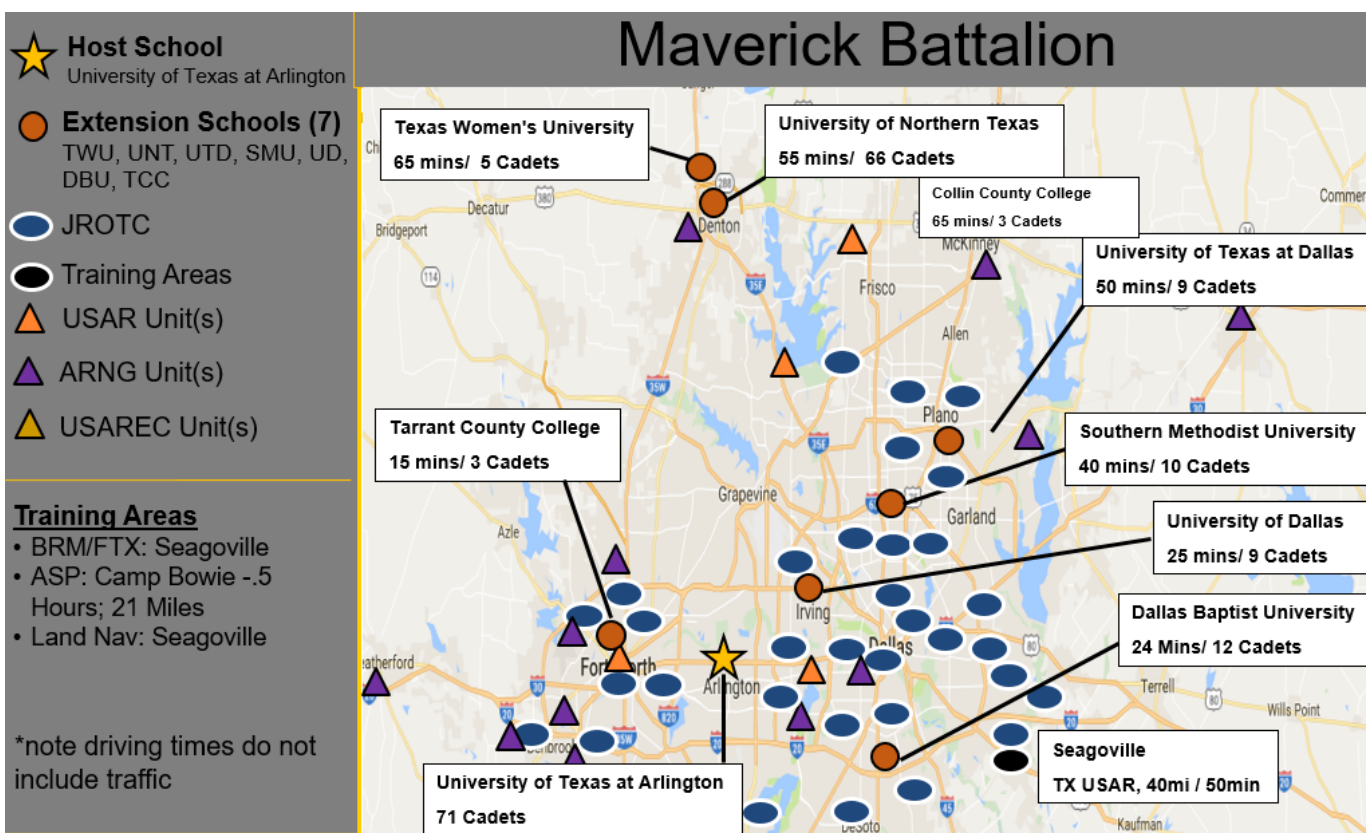
At the Front

Greetings and Happy New Year. 2022 was a year of highs and lows, and I would like to share many of our triumphs and laughter but also be transparent with our tears and struggles as we continue our mission to recruit, train, and commission officers of great character into the U.S. Army.

Let me begin with the distribution and

complexity of our landscape, illustrated below. The UTA/UNT 14-person (10 cadre, four staff) team is responsible for nine schools across 3K square miles and over 200 cadets (map includes only contracted cadets). We are responsible for supporting over 30 JROTC programs, in addition to supporting our Universities, partnerships, communities, cadet outreach initiatives, etc.



With a ratio of 1 cadre for every 20 cadets, every team member must be a jack-of-all-trades and make every touch point with the cadets count, so after a year on the job, the question becomes, how are we doing and how do we know our efforts are effective? As my momma would say, the "proof is in the pudding," meaning judgment comes from results, so let me proudly share ours.

Our **MSI** enrollment at UTA has doubled, thanks to the motivational instruction from the MSI instructor, CPT Marlon Sanders, and the recruitment efforts of Mr. Kevin Smith.

MSII cadets have retained at a higher rate thanks to CPT Sanders again and to the involvement of fall MSII instructor, 2LT Jenna Lawrence.

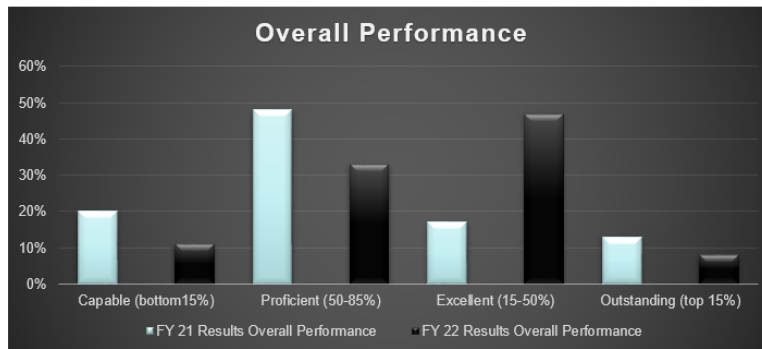
MSIII is really where the rubber meets the road; as you know, Cadet Summer Training (CST) consists of 27% percent of the cadet's accessions order of merit list (OML), and thanks to the training and mentorship of CPT Rachel Wood

and CPT Grant Stark (now retired), our cadets had a record-breaking year at CST 2022 by more than doubling the overall performance scores of Excellent, to include an increase of RECONDO, platoon rankings and weapons qualifications.

CST 21 vs. CST 22

In conjunction with CST, the Academic, Leadership, and Physical Outcomes that determine the 6K+ national cadet OML for component and branch of choice, our now MSIVs are proof hard work pays off. First, some stats to frame the success of these cadets.

- The national average of first choice for basic branch was 65%; the Maverick BN has a 37% HIGHER average at 89% of cadets earning their first branch pick.
- The national average of cadets receiving one of their top three choices is 89%; the Maverick BN is 100%, all cadets earned one of their top three branch choices.
- For the Cyber branch, only 65 in the Nation (again, that's 6,000 grads) received cyber, and two of the 65 were from the Maverick BN!
- 92% of cadets who competed for active duty received active duty.

- 24% of our grads in 2023 were awarded Distinguished Military Graduate.

Congratulations to all our cadets who prioritized their future and put in the time and effort to achieve their goals. I sincerely hope that earning the component and branch of choice will lead to fulfilling a tour of duty, career, or lifetime commitment to our Nation's security in an all-volunteer force.

With so many cadet achievements, it is easy to focus on the next generation of leaders, you feel their excitement and you're so gratified of their accomplishments it's an emotional high to see them proud of themselves but my lesson for 2022 is to spend more time celebrating my cadre.
