Thus, not only the thing to be done, but the manner of doing it may be conveyed by expression. This holds good even more broadly of an appearance of calmness on the leader's part, particularly when everything seems to be going wrong. Few things can keep up the morale of troops better than the realization that their leader, with full knowledge of the difficulties of a situation, neither looks nor acts as worried as perhaps

he has a right to be. So, the manner of a leader in a tight situation may well be touched with contagious excitement so long as it is an excitement not of apprehension but of effort.” (Munson, Lyman Jr., The Infantry Journal, 1942)

As you continue your studies to become an officer and lead our outstanding young men and women, think about the Manner of a Leader. You will step out of college and into a world in turmoil. 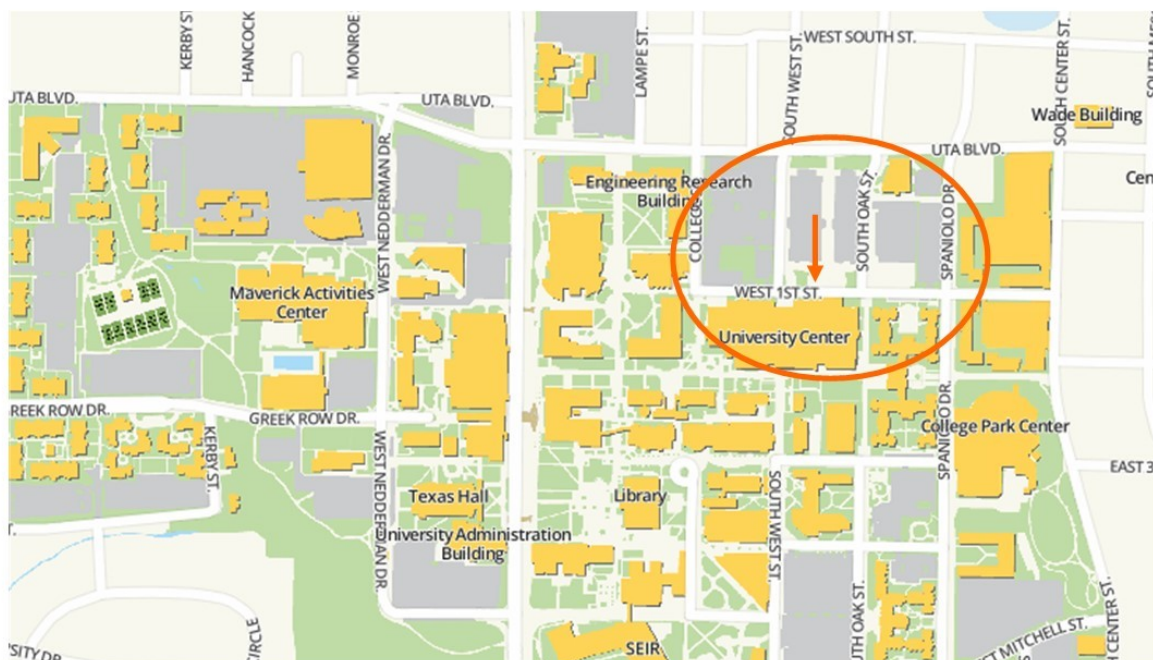

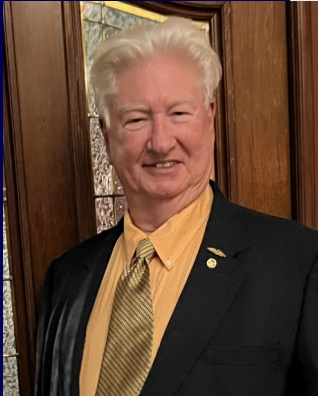

2024 Hall of Honor Inductees

LTC (Ret.) Michael W. Morrow



Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) Michael W. Morrow began his studies at The University of Texas at Arlington in 1969. Born and raised in North Richland Hills, Texas, he attended Richland High School. Mike was a member of the UTA Corps of Cadets from 1969 to 1974 and a member of the Sam Houston Rifles Drill Team for all four years, commanding the team his senior year. He graduated from the Army Ranger School, in lieu of ROTC Advanced Camp, between his junior and senior years. Mike graduated from UTA in 1974 with a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration. In 1977 he earned a Master's in Business Administration from Pepperdine University.

Following his graduation from UTA, Mike was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in Air Defense Artillery. His first duty assignment was with the 25th Infantry Division in Hawaii from 1974-1980, where he served as a Redeye Platoon Leader and as an Executive Officer for a Vulcan Battery. After graduating the ADA Advanced course as Distinguished Graduate, he commanded the first Improved HAWK battery assigned directly to XVIII Airborne Corps at Fort Bragg, NC.

From 1980-83, he served as an Assistant Professor of Military Science at North Carolina State University. He then moved to Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio, TX, where he served for three years (1983-86) as a Readiness Coordinator on the 5th Army Staff. He completed his air defense assignments with a tour in Korea (1986-87) as the sole U.S. liaison officer to the U.S. Air Forces Korea and the Republic of Korea Army. From 1987-90, Mike served as the Director of Research/Joint Force Employment Instructor on the faculty of the U.S. Air Force Academy.

From 1990-93, he was assigned to the Army Element of U.S. Space Command as a Command-and-Control Warning Officer, followed by assignments at the Pentagon (1993-95) as a Space Operations Officer and as a senior advisor on classified space programs

to the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Space. As a Space staff officer, he played a vital role planning for the integration and use of space systems during Operation Desert Storm; provided oversight and reviewed Army special programs for space and information operations application by STRATCOM; wrote the National Security Space Policy and participated in multiple demonstrations of operational capabilities ranging from directed energy to surveillance and reconnaissance at the Office of the Secretary of Defense.

After retiring from the Army, Mike successfully managed multi-million-dollar projects at the National Reconnaissance Office, National Security Agency, and Central Intelligence Agency across a wide variety of disciplines, including Measurement and Signatures Intelligence, Space Operations and Space Control, Information Operations/Cyber Warfare, Surveillance and Reconnaissance, Missile Warning/Missile Defense, and Special Technical Operations.

Among LTC Morrow's awards are the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, three awards of the Army Meritorious Service Medal, multiple Army and Air Force Commendation Medals, and numerous service decorations. He also earned the Ranger Tab, the Senior Air Force Space Badge, and the Army Parachutist badge.

Mike credits his participation in the UTA ROTC program with much of the success he enjoyed in his early military career. He is a life member of the Sam Houston Rifles Alumni Association and the UTA Cadet Corps Alumni Council. He has also been a regular participant in UTA Military Department Hall of Honor events.

Mike has been married to his college sweetheart Charlene Morrow for 50 years. They live in North Richland Hills, Texas.

COL (Ret.) Paul E. Berg

Colonel (Retired) Paul Berg grew up in Amarillo, Texas. He graduated with a BA in Business Administration from the University of North Texas in 1993. While working on his master's degree at UNT he joined the UTA ROTC program as a Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP) cadet. As a cadet he served as a company commander and S3 in 1993-94 and as Battalion Executive Officer in 1994-95. He graduated from UNT with his MBA in 1995. He earned an MS degree in 2013 and a PhD in Adult Education from Kansas State University in 2016.

Colonel Berg started his Army career in 1990 as an enlisted soldier, serving as an AH-1 helicopter repairman while attending UNT. He was a Distinguished Military Graduate and commissioned in May 1995 as a Second Lieutenant in Aviation. His first assignment was at Wheeler Army Airfield, where he served as platoon leader, and then later as executive officer for B Co. 214th Aviation Regiment. In 2000, he attended the Aviation Captain's Career Course at Fort Rucker and CAS3 at Fort Leavenworth.

In 2001, Colonel Berg was assigned to the 159th Aviation Brigade, 101st Airborne Division, where he first served as the Operations Officer for C Co. 7-101st and later as Battalion S1. His unit was deployed to Afghanistan in 2002, during Operation Enduring Freedom. He returned to Fort Campbell and took command of HHC/9-101st. In 2003, his unit deployed for the invasion of Iraq with Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Colonel Berg returned to Fort Rucker as a Basic Officer Leadership Course instructor and as AVC3 Small Group Leader. He later commanded D/1-145th Aviation Regiment (BOLC) in charge of training. In addition, while serving at Fort Rucker, he sought out UTA ROTC graduates in aviation training and provided mentorship and coaching.

In 2009, Colonel Berg deployed with the 1st Cavalry Division to Iraq, where he served as

Brigade Aviation Officer in the 2nd Brigade to include a combat tour in Kirkuk. He later served as S3 and then as Battalion Executive Officer for the 1-227th Attack Aviation Regiment, with a deployment to Sharana, Afghanistan. He returned to the Command and General Staff College as an instructor. Later, he served as Battalion Commander for the 1-223rd Aviation Regiment at Fort Rucker. After Battalion Command, he served as the Vice Provost of Academic Affairs, Army University at Fort Leavenworth. He also served as the editor-in-chief for U.S. Army Large-Scale Combat Operations Historical Case Studies and editor of the Army University Press' Journal of Military Learning and Military Review.

He retired from the Army in May 2021 with more than 28 years of service.

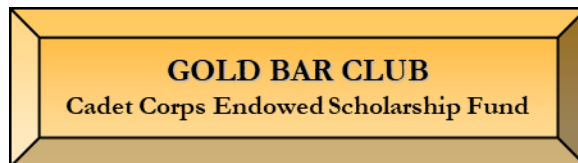
His awards and decorations include Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal (3OLC), Meritorious Service Medal (6OLC), Air Medal (2 awards), Afghanistan Campaign Medal (2 campaign stars), Iraq Campaign Medal (4 campaign stars), Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary and Service Medal, NATO Medal, Valorous Unit Citation and Meritorious Unit Citations (4), Senior Army Aviator, Army Aircrew, Air Assault, and Airborne badges.

After retirement, Dr. Berg was selected to be an Associate Professor at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College. He continues to volunteer for veteran organizations and assist veterans with PTSD. He is a member of the local American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars councils. As a proud participant in the UTA ROTC program, he continues to encourage young college students and enlisted soldiers to attend ROTC at UTA.

COL (Ret) Berg has been married to Tanya Berg for 29 years and is the father of two children—Kaela and Logan.

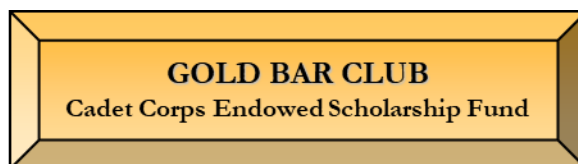

Martin Woodruff



2014 Hall of Honor inductee Martin Woodruff passed away on January 8, 2024, in Decatur, TX. Woodruff was a Vietnam War Veteran, a former POCO Graphite employee, an organizer, a mentor, a source of knowledge, and a man who was not afraid to challenge others in the community to serve alongside him.

Martin entered UTA in 1966. In 1970 he served in the Cadet Corps. As a Distinguished Military Graduate, he was commissioned in the Regular Army as a Transportation Corp Officer and detailed to Infantry for two years. During his tour in Vietnam, he served as a Platoon Leader with the Americal Division, then with MACV Advisory Team 70, and finished his tour in the

525th MI Group in Saigon. He returned to civilian life in 1979.

Returning to his home in Decatur, he became very active in local civic and political service, including the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, and the Longhorn Council of the Boy Scouts of America. He was a life member of the Wise County Veterans Group. He was elected to the Decatur City Council in 2005 served as Mayor Pro Tem from 2009 to 2012. In 2012 he became the Mayor of Decatur.

Martin is survived by his college sweetheart and wife Jana Sue, three children, and eight grandchildren.

John “Hendew” Henderson



John “Hendew” Henderson passed away on December 27, 2023. He was a Distinguished Military Student in the 1964-1965 school year while serving on the 1st Battalion Staff. John was a member of the Sam Houston Rifles Drill Team and was elected to the team staff as Guidon Bearer. He was and always will be “Hendew” to those who knew him. Due to the untimely death of his father, John withdrew from college and took over the family hardware business.

Following his college years, John worked for Radio Shack for many years. He was active with the Shriners in Arlington and was at one time employed to run their office. In 1967, he founded The Sam Houston Rifles Alumni Organization and served as the first president. This group was the predecessor of the Cadet Corp

Alumni Council where he also served on the CCAC Executive Committee for many years. His other interests included several collector cars. John and his wife Sandy were long-time residents of Arlington, Texas.
