Cody started out as an enlisted man in the Army in 1992 after a short stint as a professional baseball player. At UTA, he was Cadet Battalion Commander while simultaneously serving as Platoon Leader in the Texas National Guard. He received many awards while a cadet at UTA.

Upon graduation and receiving a Commission in the Medical Service Corps, Roberson served in numerous positions in the 82nd Airborne Division and is currently the 10th Mountain Division's Chief of Current Operations for Multi-National Division-Center Division Surgeon, Baghdad, Iraq. Additionally, he was responsible for all medical support for the entire near side operations for the Iraq and Kuwait borders during several operations. His company would fight and directly support 14 major objectives from Kuwait to the fall of Baghdad and would be credited with the treatment and evacuation of over 433 casualties. MAJ. Roberson is currently serving his second tour in Iraq with the 10th

Mountain Division. His awards, schools and training assignments, and achievements are numerous.

In Cody's spare time he started a Sports Marketing and Advertising Company that has its own Professional Fishing Team known as ArmyBassAnglers. He has 20 Major Corporations as sponsors. The Team's mission, SUPPORT.DEFEND.FISH, is dedicated to raising awareness for Returning Heroes Home, focusing the industries' attention on the military fishing market and supporting soldiers. To date, ArmyBassAnglers has raised over \$50,000 to support Returning Heroes Home and has participated in numerous fundraising and awareness events to support the troops and take them fishing.



Many of our ranks are scattered around the globe—some deployed and still on active duty, while others, by choice or happenstance decided to live elsewhere. **Theron** is in Killeen—apparently lots of rats to kill there, **Lucifer** is in Arkansas running a restaurant, **Hunter** in Louisiana, **Rex** and **Tommy** in D.C., **Mark** in Seattle, **Bill Phillips** running the GOP, **Mike Ellis** in one zip code or another in the Galveston area (depending on the Hurricanes), Herr in Michigan, and **Dulaney** still with no address. The point is, wherever we go or end up, everything we do has been touched, in some way, by our experience in the Corps, the Jodies, the Pistol or Rifle team, the ITs, the Color Guard, or the Carlisle Cannons—maybe even the marching band.

Our members in the Hall of Honor, those yet to be inducted, and everyone in the program, exemplify what the Corps of Cadets means. Not always an Army commission. Sometimes a different path was chosen—**Bevel**, **Waters** and others were Marine Corps officers. **Mark Stevens**, **Harry Stevenson**, and **Terry Moore** were in the Air Force. Some were enlisted men and women, but the common thread was the UTA Corps of Cadets.

We learned a new vocabulary—Big Red 1, Eighty Deuce, 1st Cav, M-60, 10th Mountain, G2, Hell on Wheels, MacV, I Corps, K-Ration. We found out what a right patch meant, an Oak Leaf Cluster, the Old Guard, and so much more. We could field strip an M1-A1, a 1911, an '03, a B.A.R. an M-60, and an M-16. While not a skill that has much civilian use, it's still an integral part of the military experience.

We remember the BOQ at Ft. Sam, the compass course out on Hwy 157, the O club at Carswell, and the Summer Camp at Sill or Hood. **Chuck** even remembers the Green Monster at Camp Dallas in Mineral Wells. For a number of us, these memories span over a half a century. Sadly, and by definition, our ranks are thinning,

and just this week we lost a good one—**Larry D. Smith**. The days of 1500 in the Corps are replaced by a Corps of less than 150, but on an incline nevertheless—and with the same high standards and dedication.

Typically, I fill my column with pranks and stunts from our old college days, but this time I simply wanted to give thanks to those who have served our country, and to attempt to draw the connection to the Corps of Cadets who have been so much a part of the University since its beginning over a century ago.

The mission of the Corps today is to continue to increase grades, physical abilities, and commissions. They are successful. The mission of the CCAC is to lend support to the Cadets, to increase our numbers, and to stay in touch with our Alumni. We have also
