And the . . . BEAT GOES ON!!!

On March 2 at Fort Hood, **LTC Archie Davis** was promoted to full colonel by LTG Ricky Lynch, commander of III Corps. Pinning on his eagles were the general and his loving wife, **Jackie Davis**. Also pinning on his shoulder rank was his brother, Mike, and Colonel Joel Ward.

This is significant. This is the handing forward of a tradition from one former cadet to another. **And the BEAT GOES ON!** As Colonel Davis made his acceptance remarks, he recognized Colonel Ward for believing in him, and for his continuing support and mentorship. Ward was his Professor of Military Science at UT Arlington and has tracked Davis' career for over twenty years.

Colonel Davis was the first African-American cadet colonel to command the UTA Corps of Cadets. Archie attributes much of his success to his wife Jackie and Col. Ward.

"Archie shares the credit for his accomplishments, but it was all Archie!" Ward indicated that Colonel Davis already had extensive leadership talents and skills. This is what got him promoted. He did it on his own. He further said, "Colonel Davis has much more than military leadership. He knows how to take

leadership to the next level—commitment." As you move through the military, you meet young future leaders. Such fine young leaders need to be encouraged to work on their skills and, more importantly, be ready to assume increased responsibility as *their* leader moves on. In short, it is all about creating a legacy for the future military. One leadership skill that Archie has is to get junior leaders and young soldiers to "take ownership" of their assigned jobs. Ward says, "I, too, learned that by allowing soldiers to 'own' their assignments and by giving them credit for doing so, doesn't weaken unit combat power, but literally multiplies it. I don't know where Archie learned it, but he is clearly a great leader."

Colonel Davis and Jackie have traveled often from Fort Hood to Arlington to support and participate in events for the Maverick Battalion. His most recent visit was for the Hall of Honor Ceremony 2009. **Congratulations, Colonel Davis!**
