## Brothers in Arms

Seems that over the years UTA military has always attracted brothers. Dating all the way back to Carlisle, records indicate a plethora of siblings who have walked the halls and marched the parade grounds at our university. Of course when brothers are mentioned, the first name that comes to mind is Latham—Will and Rex. They took it to the next level with Will's son Mark. All were commissioned and served our country faithfully. But there were other brothers who also served over the years. The Kennedy brothers, the Colvard brothers, the Brown brothers, and the Lunt Brothers, just to name a few.

How about the Kearby brothers? Perhaps a little too far back for most of us to remember? Maybe this will help. LTC Neel Kearby was awarded the Medal of Honor for shooting down six enemy aircraft on one mission during WWII. The date was October 11, 1943. His total confirmed victories are 22—the most of any pilot in a P-47, all done in just six months. Neel attended NTAC in 1937 and is a member of our Hall of Honor at UTA.

It's difficult to make your own mark in the world when you are living in the shadow of your brother's Medal of Honor. Nevertheless, Major John Gallatin Kearby also did pretty well for himself and certainly made UTA proud. “Gallatin,” as he was called, was also a pilot. He attended NTAC from 1923 to 1925 and received an Associate's degree. He later graduated from SMU and taught school. Gallatin served in the Army Air Corps from 1941 to 1943. He had a top-secret clearance and worked in the Material Command Lab at Wright Field.

## 107th Maverick Battalion

### FALL SEMESTER—179 CADETS

The 107<sup>th</sup> Maverick Battalion started the 2009/10 school year with 179 cadets enrolled, four more than last fall, but within the first three weeks there were 15 drops. The Battalion now has 164 cadets—39 MSIs, 45 MSIs, 48 MSIs and 26 MSIVs. There are currently 47 cadets on scholarships. Equipping the cadets was a challenge due to budgetary constraints; however, we can report that all cadets have a complete ACU uniform, boots and a rucksack.

### CADETS EXCEL AT SUMMER TRAINING

Cadets of the Maverick Battalion continue to excel in summer camp and training. A total of 21 cadets attended LDAC (Leadership Development and Assessment Course—formerly Advanced Camp) at Fort Lewis. In addition, three cadets graduated from Airborne School and two from Air Assault School. Three cadets attended LTC (Leader Training Course—formerly Basic Camp) with one becoming a Company First Sergeant, one of the highest positions in camp. Maverick Battalion cadets completed the APFT (Army Physical Fitness Test) above the Cadet Command average.

Bill Phillips was a Jodie in the early '60s. He currently lives in Brentwood, Tennessee. with Candy, his wife of 42 years. He actually finished his college at the University of Nebraska. After his five years in the service, one in Viet Nam, Bill became a reporter in California and later in Nevada, and then got into politics. After running the gubernatorial campaign twice in Nevada, Bill became the chief of staff for the Governor of Nevada. In 1983, Bill moved to D.C. and became the chief of staff for the Republican National Committee and executive chairman for the George H.W. Bush Political Action Committee. He was a visiting scholar at Vanderbilt University

and wrote a short book about the media's role in the private lives of political officials.

Bill then worked for five years at Vanderbilt. He was recruited to become deputy mayor of Nashville, Tennessee, and held that job for seven and a half years. Afterward, Bill formed the Bill Phillips Company—a public affairs strategy firm.

Bill and Candy have three grown children and four grandchildren. Their children are teachers, and one son served in the 101<sup>st</sup>. Gallatin Kearby played an important role in the development of the high altitude pressure suit, and was the first Army Air Corps officer to test the suit in a pressure chamber. In October 1942, he tested a pressure suit to an altitude of 60,200 ft. This work was critical in high flying aircraft such as the U-2 and the SR-71. And Gallatin's work pioneered the space suits used by today's astronauts. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Not only were John and Neel brothers, they were both Army Pilots, both graduated from NTAC (UTA), both

were officers in the Army during WWII, both were highly decorated (MOH and DFC), and sadly, both died in the service of their country while flying. Neel was shot down in the Pacific on March 5, 1944, and John died in a test flight less than a year before that, on August 2, 1943.



UTA's proud tradition of Military Science continues today. Our cadets continue to do well—while in school and after graduation—both in and out of the military. During the annual Homecoming Activities at UTA, the largest alumni group continues to be the men and women who were enrolled in Military Science.
