Greetings from the 115th Maverick Battalion. Since our last *Reveille*, the Maverick Battalion has been busy. We opened up the year at the Welcome Back lab on 24 August, where I was able to address the new and returning cadets, letting them know what to expect in the coming year. The highlight of the day was contracting five cadets and commissioning two cadets. 2LT Lauren Pohl commissioned into the Adjutant General Corps, while 2LT Sena Delou commissioned into the Quartermaster Corps. Since the Welcome Back lab, we have contracted five additional cadets.

Training has moved at a rapid pace this fall. We have conducted map reading, land navigation, individual movement, squad movement, combat water survival, and medical training during our labs thus far. From 21-23 September, we conducted our fall field training exercise (FTX), bringing together the cadets who attend ROTC at the University of Texas at Arlington and those who attend ROTC at the University of North Texas. Not only did the FTX give the cadets an opportunity to practice their military skill set and field craft, it was the first time all the cadets in the Maverick Battalion had an opportunity to come together in the same place to meet and bond with one another.

In the last issue, I mentioned that the Maverick Battalion gained the University of North Texas, along with Texas Woman's University. Since, we have also established a partnership with Collin College, whose leadership has demonstrated their eagerness to

All contributions are deposited to the Endowed Scholarship Fund and only the interest earned on that fund is made available for the scholarships each year. The principal stays intact and continues to draw interest. 3.) Scholarships are made available to UTA Army ROTC Military Science cadets based on merit and need. 4.) The Endowment principal grows with each year's contributions, thus the interest available for scholarships grows. 5.) There are restrictions on how the scholarship funds can be used; there are requirements for selection, including the approval of the current PMS of the UTA Military Science Dept.

**C.) Are the scholarships helping the cadets?** Yes! See the testimonials in this issue of the *Reveille*. In addition, as the Endowment Principle continues to grow, so can the number and monetary value of the scholarships.

**D.) Is there any additional value to the program?** Yes! The competition to attract the top candidates for US Army Officers through Senior ROTC programs is fierce among Universities today. Any additional benefit available to students can be a tool to help recruitment of the Top Prospects, and that is what UTA Military Science and the US Army want. The best!

**E.) OK so what is it going to cost me?** The current Gold Bar average pledge is \$12.70 per each 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. commissioned each year. However, the pledge amount of each Alumnus is entirely up to the donor, and is not made public. It can be as conservative as \$1.00 per each new 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. commissioned that year, or as much as you choose. You alone pick your pledge amount and retain total control over it. You can change the pledge amount at any time. You can also withdraw temporarily or permanently at any time you desire. It's all up to you! Each year you receive a letter of appreciation from UTA recognizing your contribution as a tax deductible donation.

August 25, 2017, was a tragic day for many Texans living along the Gulf Coast. Hurricane Harvey hit with winds topping 130 mph. In the wake of this major catastrophe, Governor Abbott activated the entire Texas National Guard. Of those activated, six current ROTC cadets and one newly commissioned 2LT from our Maverick Battalion were deployed: **Jeanine Lee, Nathan Huffman, Sokret Sathit, Joseph Beasley, Nathan Tittle, Benjamin Rhodes, and 2LT Nicholas Hergenrother**. I had the opportunity to talk with CDT Huffman and 2LT Hergenrother. CDT Huffman was deployed with Delta Co. 156<sup>th</sup> Brigade Engineer Battalion. The mission was to assist the citizens of the Texas Gulf Coast and provide relief to those affected by Hurricane Harvey. Much of this consisted of providing the citizens with food and water. When asking CDT Huffman if there was something that touched him while providing relief, he said, “Despite diversity, people came together to help one another.” He told me of a woman they met who was housing 4 families – totaling about 25 people – in her home.

2LT Hergenrother was deployed with Charlie Troop 1-124 Cavalry. That mission was to go to Houston and surrounding areas to execute high-water search-and-rescue missions utilizing Zodiacs. 2LT Hergenrother’s response to being asked if there was something that touched him was “The sense of community.” He continued on to say that he was working with military personnel, civil authorities, and volunteers. “The volunteers blew my mind. They were there every day, just like the military personnel, but their houses were flooded. It was truly heartwarming and humbling.”

Puerto Rico is also suffering from Hurricane Maria, a nearly Category 5 hurricane as it made landfall on September 20. Many CACC members volunteered time and resources to assist with the relief efforts. Thank you to all who have served, are serving, and will serve communities that are devastated by natural disasters. 
### We have a NEW Website!

### The Sam Houston Rifles




The crest above is a distinctive emblem of the Sam Houston Rifles is a combination of two devices. One is an old one the Houston, the other is as old as our nation.

The original rifle with a barrel as a significant part of our country's history symbolizing the United States Army. It is analyzed by John Lee Ranger with the Independence Hall.

The resolution of the crest is a symbol of the Civil War of Sam Houston, whose name personally, the shield of the Sam Houston Rifles. His coat of arms may be traced to a Houston knight who died William the Conqueror in 1066, Sir Hugh of Poitiers. Sir Hugh's coat of arms in 1066 was the same as it is today. 
