

A Call for HOH 2024 Submissions

Believe it or not, planning for the 2024 Hall of Honor is starting. The 2024 Hall of Honor will be on **February 24, 2024**. Part of the planning process is to gather a list of nominees and submit them to the selection committee for consideration. We need your help in putting this list together. Members of the CCAC can nominate anyone who meets the following criteria in one of these three categories:

Cadet Corps Alumni—This category is for any individual who participated one or more years in the Army ROTC program and was under the authority of the Professor of Military Science (PMS) hosted at The University of Texas at Arlington or any of the former schools of what is now The University of Texas at Arlington (UTA). Individuals may be nominated for their outstanding accomplishments in a military or civilian career.

Honorary—This category is for any individual who, although not a participant in the Cadet Corps, served as a member of the staff of the Military Science Department, staff and faculty of any university or college whose

cadets fall/fell under the authority of the PMS at The University of Texas at Arlington, or any of the former schools that are part of the University's lineage, or special friends of the Cadet Corps. Any individual nominated in this category must have demonstrated through his/her service a special dedication or significant contribution to the Cadet Corps. Nominations in this category are limited and controlled by the Cadet Corps Alumni Council.

Service—This category is reserved to recognize those individuals who did not participate in the Cadet Corps and do not meet the criteria for the Honorary category, but who attended and received a degree, undergraduate or graduate, from The University of Texas at Arlington, or any of the former schools of what is now The University of Texas at Arlington. Such individuals must have served in a branch of the U.S. Armed Forces and achieved a noteworthy accomplishment in his or her military and/or civilian career. Nomina-

tions in this category will only be considered in very exceptional cases and will be controlled and limited by the Corps of Cadets Alumni Council.

The nomination form can be downloaded from the Cadet Corps Alumni Council website at **cadetcorps.org**. Click on the HALL OF HONOR Tab to download and print the nomination form. The form is self-explanatory. Once completed, it can be mailed to Ms. Sarah Nahhas, 2670 East Lamar Blvd, Arlington, TX 76011. **Nomination forms need to be received by 1 August 2023.**

After graduating high school, he attended Texas A&M University in College Station, TX as a member of the Aggie Corps of Cadets. He graduated in 2014 with a Bachelor of Science in Political Science and commissioned as a Field Artillery officer through Army ROTC that same year. He has since served at Fort Cavazos in 1ST Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1ST Cavalry Division where he deployed on rotation to the Republic of Korea and Poland/Germany

in Europe. After Graduating FA Captains Career Course, he was stationed with 75TH Field Artillery Brigade at Fort Sill where he deployed to CENTCOM as part of the ARCENT Force Field Artillery Headquarters and Commanded an MLRS Battery while forward deployed to the Republic of Korea once more. CPT Shannon and his wife of seven years, Kristi Shannon, share their home with one dog, Little Ann. CPT Shannon is eager serve as Assistant Professor of Military Science at UT Arlington. In Tribute: General Richard E. Cavazos

We are proud to recognize and celebrate that on 9 May 2023, Fort Hood was officially redesignated Fort Cavazos in tribute to General Richard E. Cavazos. General Cavazos was the first Hispanic American to earn the rank of four-star general and was a 1949 graduate of the then North Texas Agricultural College (NTAC), a junior college, which later became UTA. General Cavazos was in the first group inducted into UTA's Military Science Hall of Honor.

We are borrowing the below text (with some minor editing) from his Hall of Honor citation.

“During the period of 1947 to 1949, General Cavazos attended the University when it was North Texas Agricultural College, better known as NTAC, and participated as a member of the Corps of Cadets. He was a member of the renowned Crack Drill Team, the Sam Houston Rifles. He reached the rank of Cadet Captain and served as a Cadet Company Commander.

Following completion of his ROTC training and graduation from NTAC he transferred to Texas Tech University to complete his college degree. He graduated from Texas Tech with a Bachelor of Science degree in Geology. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Infantry as a distinguished Military Graduate. General Cavazos' military career took him from leading an infantry platoon in combat to commanding an entire Army Corps. He began by leading a platoon and commanding a company during the Korean War. Later in Vietnam, he commanded an infantry battalion of the 1st Infantry Division. Following Vietnam, he commanded a brigade of the 1st Infantry Division at Fort Riley, Kansas, and later was the Assistant Division Commander of the 2d Armored Division at Fort Hood. He was the Commanding General of the 9th Infantry Division at Fort Lewis, Washington.

In February 1980 he was promoted to Lieutenant General and assumed command of the U.S. Army III Corps and the largest installation in the Southwest Fort

Hood, Texas. In addition to the troop duty assignments, he served on both the Department of the Army and Department of Defense staffs. He was a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College, Command and General Staff College, Army War College, and the British Army Staff College.

General Cavazos' final military assignment was command of the U.S. Army Forces Command. His early support for the National Training Center and his involvement in the development of the Battle Command Training Program enormously influenced the war fighting capabilities of the U.S. Army.

General Cavazos retired in 1984 after 33 years of Army service, continuing to mentor young general officers. Among his many honors, he was inducted in 1993 into Fort Leavenworth's Command and General Staff College Hall of Fame.

He was the recipient of numerous awards and decorations. Most noteworthy is the fact that he was twice decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross, the Nation's second-highest award for gallantry in action. He also was the recipient of the Silver Star (2 awards), Distinguished Flying Cross, Legion of Merit (2 awards), Bronze Star Medal (5 awards), Air Medal, and the Purple Heart. He also proudly wore the Combat Infantryman's Badge with Star to signify his role in combat as an Infantryman during two conflicts.

General Cavazos was honored as a Distinguished Alumni by The University of Texas at Arlington in 1975. General Cavazos' performance while at North Texas Agricultural College as a cadet in the Corps of Cadets and his subsequent achievements in the U.S. Army brought great credit and recognition upon himself, The University of Texas at Arlington, and the U.S. Army.

General Cavazos died in San Antonio, Texas on 29 October 2017 (aged 88).”

LTC (Ret) Lee B. Wilson

LTC (Ret) Lee B. Wilson passed away at age 87 on March 27, 2023.

Lee entered Arlington State College twice: first in 1955 and again in 1958; his attendance was interrupted by a professional baseball contract. He returned to Arlington when the minor league folded. He returned to the Sam Houston Rifles, serving

as a Squad Leader, First Sergeant, and Executive Officer. A Distinguished Military Graduate in 1962, he was commissioned in Infantry. In 1966 he volunteered for combat duty in the Republic of Vietnam and served three tours with the 5th Special Forces Group in Vietnam. His numerous decorations include The Silver Star, The Bronze Star

with V and 2 Oak Leaf Clusters, and 2 Purple Hearts. LTC Wilson was inducted into the UTA Military Science Hall of Honor in 2010.



MAJ (Ret) Jim Brackenridge



MAJ (Ret) Jim Brackenridge, UTA Professor of Military Science 1980-1983, passed away on April 30, 2023. He is described by his friend Terry Hestilow as a great man, a leader, and a mentor. He was the one officer General of the Army Omar Bradley requested to

be his Aide-de-camp while he was in Texas. His 23 years of active service included a tour in Vietnam as a MACV Advisor in 1970-71. He retired in 1983 following his service at UTA. MAJ Brackenridge and his wife Diana lived in Corpus Christi, Texas. His burial was

held at The Coastal Bend Veteran's Cemetery in Corpus Christi on May 15th at 2:00PM with full military honors.

On the Road to Becoming a 501(c)(3) By Jerry Bob Houston, Former President of CCAC

Every CCAC member with an email address on file should have received an email from the CCAC recently requesting a vote on changes to our bylaws. Many of you may not know what this is all about.

For many years we have discussed setting up our organization as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. Today, the only way a donor to the CCAC can receive a tax deduction is by making a donation to the Endowed Scholarship Fund or the Life Membership Endowment through The University of Texas at Arlington. Becoming a 501(c)(3) will allow us to provide individuals and corporations who want to make donations directly to the CCAC with a tax-deductible receipt for their donation. Updating our bylaws is the first step in this process.

The main shortfall of our current bylaws is the lack of instructions on what would happen to our cash on hand if the CCAC should ever dissolve. The easy answer is to transfer our funds to the Endowed Life Membership Fund. We chose this fund because it provides the most flexibility to the Professor of Military Science in how the money can be used. We also took the opportunity to clean up the bylaws by making several other timely changes (such as including email as a contact method).

Let me explain a little more why we should become a charitable organization. We have found there are individuals and corporations that would like to support the Military Science De-

partment but do not want to do so through the University funding bureaucracy, and yet they would also like to have recognition of the donation as a tax deduction. If we were a non-profit charitable organization, we could provide the required paperwork to individuals or corporations for their tax deduction—and for use when we purchase items and services for the department as well.

Just a reminder about the two endowments we have with UTA. Both these endowments work the same way. Each year 80% of the interest received from the endowment investments are made available to the Professor of Military Science to support the department and cadets. The annual interest from the Endowed Scholarship Fund is used to fund cadet scholarships. This fund currently has over \$240,000 (market value) and is averaging a distribution of over \$8,000 a year for cadet scholarships.

The Endowed Life Membership Fund is our second endowment. It was set up to support Military Science Department activity. The LM Fund has almost \$150,000 (market value), produces a yearly distribution of nearly \$5,000, and is set up so that the PMS has wide latitude on how the funds can be used. Although we were very deliberate when we set up the fund, usage has to be invoiced by the Department through approved University vendors. It often turns out there are a few things cropping up yearly that the Fund cannot be used for, such as cadet

trips or equipment. If CCAC could solicit its own donations and offer tax deduction receipts, it would have funds to help pay for those extra cadet needs.
